- Oct. 7 BONNARD AND HIS ENVIRONMENT. More than 80 paintings, 60 drawings, prints nov. 29 and posters. Many of the paintings are from the artist's estate and have never before been seen in this country. Directed by James Elliott, Director of Fine Arts, Los Angeles County Museum of Art, and Monroe Wheeler, Director of Exhibitions and Publications, The Museum of Modern Art. - Sept. 15 PAINTERS AND SCULPTORS AS PRINTMAKERS. An international selection of works Oct. 25 from the last two decades. Selected by William S. Lieberman, Curator of Drawings and Prints. First floor, gallery 2.
- Nov. ANDRÉ KERTESZ. A one-man show of photographs by Kertesz, born in Budapest in 1894, now living in New York. Selected by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography. First floor, galleries 5 and 6.
