July 31 -Sept. 10 KURT SCHWITTERS. A survey of the work of Kurt Schwitters drawn from the Museum Collections, with examples dating from 1918 through his last works made in the 1940s in England. It will include collages, for which he is most • famous, as well as prints, examples of graphic design and advertisements, and slides of the Merzbau. Directed by Jennifer Licht, Associate Curator, Department of Painting and Sculpture. 1st floor.

#### CURRENT EXHIBITIONS

through ITALY: THE NEW DOMESTIC LANDSCAPE. One of the largest and most important design shows ever held by the Museum, this exhibition reports on current developments in Italy with more than 160 objects for household use and 12 environments commissioned by the Museum. These are intended for two modes of contemporary living -- the permanent home and the mobile unit. The exhibition illustrates some of the concerns of industrial societies throughout the world and represents a wide range of conflicting theories about the present state of design activity, its relationship to the building industry and to urban development, and the growing distrust of objects of consumption. Major areas are devoted to audio-visual presentations explaining the purpose of the exhibits; a concluding audio-visual section provides an analysis and critique of the problems raised. PROJECTS: RICHARD TUTTLE AND DAVID NOVROS. Part of a continuing series of exhibitions reporting on recent developments in contemporary art, this exhibition is devoted to the work of two young American artists. By the simple process of drawing lines on the walls and attaching wires, Richard Tuttle investigates perceptual problems and also creates a contemplative space. David Novros has painted a 10' high by 32' long fresco. Its composition is based on a system of rectangular areas of color which he has been using in his recent paintings. - ATGET'S TREES. 40 photographs by the great French photographer Eugène Atge through (1857-1927). Trees were among this photographer's favorite subjects, and Sept. 5 he apparently photographed them throughout his career. This aspect of his work has been relatively little studied or exhibited, as opposed to his do mentation of the social and cultural aspects of French life. Directed by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography Steichen Gallery, 3rd floor. (opened June 7)

SYMBOLISM, SYNTHETISM AND THE FIN-DE-SIECLE. This exhibition presents a v through perspective of the late 19th century, indicating the multiplicity of ideas Oct. 2 the parallel currents of artistic conscience at work during this time. It also attempts to distinguish between the formal and interpretive ideas of the Symbolist and Synthetist artists as best seen in their prints and show how the artists of each country incorporated symbolist principles in the d velopment of a unique vision. Included are prints, drawings, and illustra books from the Museum collection by Aman-Jean, Bonnard, Denis, Gauguin, Hod Redon, Seguin, Toorop and Vuillard, among cthers. Directed by Donna M. EUROPEAN DRAWINGS FROM THE COLLECTION. Directed by William S. Lieberman through Chief Curator of Drawings, Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor. (opened June 27) Oct. 2

FUTURE OPENINGS (incomplete listing; dates tentative)

AFRICAN TEXTILES AND DECORATIVE ARTS. This survey will present approximation Oct. 11 -Jan. 31 250 examples of African textiles, ornaments and useful objects, which have remained largely unknown in the western world to all but collectors and mut curators. The exhibition will be divided into two major categories:

1) textiles, 2) body ornaments. An audio-visual presentation will show much of the material in actual use. Selected by Roy Sieber, Professor of Fine Arts, at Indiana University, with the assistance of Katherine White Reswick, who has made a photographic survey of African decorative arts in 23 public institutions and 57 private collections in 22 states. A book by Professor Sieber, with approximately 250 illustrations, will accompany the exhibition. To be installed by Arthur Drexler, Director, Department of Architecture and Design. The exhibition will later be shown at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the M. H. de Young Memorial Museum of San Francisco and The Cleveland Museum of Art. 1st floor.
