PROJECTS: VIDEO XXIV, on view at The Museum of Modern Art February 1 through February 27, 1979, consists of eight new works by artists living in Seattle and New York. The wide range of the artists' approaches to the medium can be seen in such works as Norie Sato's abstract Horizon and Bill Ritchie's Verbal Non-Communication.

"Since the late sixties, artists in the United States and abroad have used portable video cameras, projectors, synthesizers and computers to make personal statements in the form of videotapes and environmental installations," notes Barbara London, director of the exhibition.

Other works in the exhibition include: Alan Lande's fē•nōm'ē nōl'ō•jī and Susan Starr, Fred Naiden and David Kirkpatrick's Milton Le Toaster, which is subtitled Divertimento for a Public of Moderate Visual Culture, Little Reading and Mere Wealth.
