TEN IMPORTANT SOVIET FILMS FROM THE 1920'S ARE ACQUIRED BY THE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART FILM ARCHIVES: TO BE SCREENED BEGINNING AUGUST 30, 1979

The Museum of Modern Art's Film Archives have acquired ten important Soviet films of the silent era from GOSFILMOFOND, the major film archive in the U.S.S.R., and will screen the films in their original versions without English intertitles beginning Thursday, August 30 through Tuesday, September 11, 1979. Extensive program notes will be available at each screening and at most screenings there will be piano accompaniment. The new acquisitions are shown as part of SOVIET CINEMA, a series-in-progress organized upon the occasion of the 60th Anniversary of Soviet cinema. The series, which began August 6, contains 17 programs including Soviet films already in the Archives. Each program will be screened twice.

The new acquisitions include key works by VERTOV, PROTAZANOV, KULESHOV, SHUB and DOVZHENKO, made in the years 1923 through 1927, part of a period during which the U.S.S.R. made significant contributions to the development of international cinema. The films balance out The Museum's already outstanding collection of Soviet films, according to Eileen Bowser, Curator of the Film Archives, who selected the films in the series with Larry Kardish, Associate Curator of Film.

Protazanov's AELITA (1926), based on a novel by Alexei Tolstoy and a precursor of modern science-fiction, is the first of the new acquisitions to be screened (Thursday, August 30 at 2:30 PM and Saturday, September 1 at 5 PM).

Three films by Vertov are among the acquisitions: A SIXTH OF (ONE SIXTH OF/A PART OF) THE WORLD (1926), FORWARD, SOVIET! (1926) and KINO-EYE (1924), a film which demonstrates "Kino-eye", his revolutionary approach to documentary filmmaking which involved his "search for truth in documentary through the use of editing and other

means of cinematic expression," explains Eileen Bowser. Vertov was a prophet of cinema-verite. A fourth Vertov film from the Archives, ENTHUSIASM (SYMPHONY OF THE DONBAS) (1931), will be shown in the series.

The other acquisitions are Perestiani's RED IMPS (RED DEMONS) (1923), the first Soviet film to compete successfully with all foreign films on Russian screens; DEATH RAY (1925) by Kuleshov who has been called the first aesthetic theoretician/film-maker; A KISS FOR MARY PICKFORD (1927), a comedy made by Kuleshov's pupil Komarov, who combined, in this film, fiction footage with newsreel footage of Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks' Moscow visit; SVENIGORA (1927), Dovzhenko's haunting 'cine-poem' of the Ukraine which the filmmaker termed "a catalogue of all my creative possibilities"; THE GREAT ROAD (compiled from Soviet newsreels, 1917-1927) by Shub; and THE CIGARETTE GIRL FROM MOSSELPROM (1924) by Zheliabuzshky.

In the 1920's, a decade which saw some of the greatest achievements in film, the U.S.S.R. set new standards for filmmaking and influenced the world of cinema through the work and theories of such directors as EISENSTEIN, PUDOVKIN, KULESHOV and VERTOV. Although the Russian film industry had already produced some 2000 films before 1917, it was not until the nationalization of the cinema in 1919 that film began to emerge in that country as a major art form and political force within a rich climate of artistic activity.

The Museum of Modern Art's film showings are free to the public with Museum admission or membership. The film program is made possible in part by public funds from The New York State Council on the Arts and by a grant from The National Endowment for the Arts.
