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THE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART PRESENTS A BIRTHDAY TRIBUTE TO NEW DAY FILMS

New Day Films, the distinguished, cooperatively run distribution company for independent filmmakers, is celebrating its tenth anniversary this year, and the Department of Film is pleased to contribute to the celebration with a program titled HAPPY BIRTHDAY, NEW DAY FILMS. The series, which will consist of 21 outstanding works from the New Day catalogue, will be shown in the Museum's Roy and Niuta Titus Theater 2 from June 17 through June 21.

In explaining the history of their company, the New Day filmmakers have written that "We began in 1972 as a distribution cooperative for feminist films. Over time, it became clear that feminism was more than the domain of women or 'women's issues' alone." From an initial group of four feminist members, New Day has expanded to represent 29 filmmakers and has a catalogue of 39 award-winning films on a broad range of topics: growing up, growing old, working for justice on the job, labor history, sex roles, the environment, and creativity. Not only has New Day become a model cooperative of and for independent filmmakers, but through its documentary films it has participated in and charted many of the social changes in the United States over the last decade.

The series will begin on June 17 with a program introduced by Joanne Grant, East Coast Coordinator for the tenth anniversary celebration. The program will include Ms. Grant's Fundi: The Story of Ella Baker (1981), a portrait of a civil rights activist and organizer. Also on the opening program will be Felicia Lowe's China: Land of My Father (1979), the story of the filmmakers' trip to mainland China in search of her father's roots, and Quilts in Women's Lives (1981), directed by Pat Ferrero, a series of portraits of seven women from disparate backgrounds who all have made a traditional art part of their daily lives.

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Among the other films to be shown in the course of the series are the Academy Award nominees Union Maids, With Babies and Banners, Men's Lives, China: The Other Half of the Sky, and In Our Water. Noon screenings on Saturday, June 18 and Sunday, June 19 will present a program of interest to adolescents, including Liane Brandon's Once Upon a Choice (1981), a delightful fairy-tale about sex-role stereotypes, Bonnie Friedman's The Flashettes (1977), a celebration of young urban women and sports, and Am I Normal? (1979), directed by Debra Franco and David Shepard, a funny and informative situation comedy about adolescent male sexuality. The series will close on June 21 with a program of films that are new to New Day: Ralph Arlyck's An Acquired Taste (1981), a high-spirited study of the American obsession with success, and Bonnie Friedman's The Last to Know (1981), an examination of alcoholism and prescription drug abuse among women.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, NEW DAY FILMS has been organized by the Department of Film in cooperation with New Day Films. The Museum's film program is made possible with public funds from the New York State Council on the Arts and by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.
