GODZILLA: KING OF THE MONSTERS May 17, 18

On the occasion of the thirtieth anniversary of its American release, <u>Godzilla, King of the Monsters</u> will be screened at The Museum of Modern Art on Saturday, May 17 at 2:30 p.m., and Sunday, May 18 at 5:30 p.m. <u>Godzilla, King of the Monsters</u> is Terry Morse's adaptation of the original 1954 Japanese film <u>Gojira</u>, directed by Inoshiro Honda. For Morse's American version, over twenty minutes were deleted and replaced with scenes featuring Raymond Burr.

FOCUS: AWARD-WINNING STUDENT FILMS '85 May 17, 18

Eight award-winning films of FOCUS (Films of College and University Students) will be screened at The Museum of Modern Art on Saturday, May 17 at 5:30 p.m., and Sunday, May 18 at 2:30 p.m. Principally sponsored by Nissan Motor Corporation in the U.S.A., FOCUS has honored young filmmakers and screenwriters since 1976 through scholarship funds and prizes of \$60,000 annually.

The program includes two narrative films: Frank Kerr's <u>Caesura</u>, about two men in combat in Vietnam; and Camille Thomasson's <u>Heroes</u>, a <u>film set</u> in the forties which examines a child's perception of her father. Also included are two documentaries from California: Mehrdad Haghiri's <u>In Our Image</u>, about the "birth" of a mannequin; and Alison Nigh-Strelich's <u>Debonair Dancers</u>, about teachers of ballroom dance who have worked with the mentally and physically handicapped for over forty years. Four short animation films are scheduled: Joanna Priestley and Steven Subotnick's <u>The Dancing Bulrushes</u>, based on a traditional Indian tale about Coyote, the trickster; James Duesing's <u>Impetigo</u>, about play in a nocturnal landscape; Ellen Woodbury's <u>I Want to Be Like You</u>, about an animation artist's search for inspiration and self-confidence; and Doug Chiang's <u>Mental Block</u>, a clay animation film in which a character struggles with an immovable rock.

The eighty-minute program will be presented in The Roy and Niuta Titus Theater 2. FOCUS: AWARD-WINNING STUDENT FILMS '85 has been organized by Jytte Jensen, curatorial assistant, Department of Film.
