Mar 1-13 El Indio: The Films of Emilio Fernández

Emilio Fernández—known to his fans as "El Indio"—was the most celebrated filmmaker to emerge from the Golden Age of Mexican cinema, bringing an image of an eternal, elemental Mexico to the international festival circuit of the 1940s and '50s. All films are directed by Emilio Fernández, from Mexico, and in Spanish with English subtitles, unless otherwise noted.

Janitzio. 1935. Directed by Carlos Navarro. Emilio Fernández appeared in his first leading role, as a heroic representative of the "butterfly fishermen" of Lake Pátzcuaro, in this sole feature film directed by the actor Carlos Navarro. 62 min. Thu, Mar 1, 5:30; Wed, Mar 7, 7:00

María Candelaria. 1943. Winning both the Palme d'Or and Best Cinematography awards at the 1946 Cannes Film Festival, María Calendaria—a self-consciously mythological tale of a pair of lovers menaced by a covetous shopkeeper—marked Mexico's entry into the highest ranks of world cinema. 97 min.

Flor silvestre. 1943. Fernández's personal style first coalesced in this 1943 feature, with Pedro Armendáriz as the son of a pre-revolutionary landowner in love with a poor Indian woman (the impossibly photogenic Dolores del Río). 90 min.

Enamorada. 1946. Enamorada introduces the fierce, passionate María Félix to Fernández's gallery of Mexican archetypes—here as the proud daughter of a provincial aristocrat, who attracts the attention of the boyish revolutionary general in command of their town during the 1910 uprising. 96 min.

La perla (The Pearl). 1947. In this parable, based on John Steinbeck's novella, an oyster diver discovers a gigantic pearl he hopes will bring happiness to his wife and young son, only to discover that the world doesn't work that way for the poor and disenfranchised. Winner of the Golden Lion at the Venice Film Festival. 85 min. Sat, Mar 3, 1:30; Wed. Mar 7, 5:00

The Fugitive. 1947. Mexico/USA. Directed by John Ford. Ford effectively took over the crew of his friend and fellow spirit Fernández and, with Fernández acting as his "first lieutenant," filmed this abstract, ambitious work, ostensibly an adaptation of Graham Greene's unfilmably scandalous *The Power and the Glory*. 104 min. Río Escondido. 1947. After a symbolic prologue that links her to Diego Rivera's murals of Mexican history, an idealistic young schoolteacher answers the call of Mexican president Miguel Alemán to bring enlightenment to remote rural districts. 103 min. Sat, Mar 3, 7:00; Thu, Mar 8, 4:30

Maclovia. 1948. Fernández returns to the iconic "butterfly fishermen" of Lake Pátzcuaro for this partial remake of the 1935 *Janitzio*, now with María Félix as the Indian maiden ready to make the ultimate sacrifice—offering herself to a viciously racist army officer in exchange for the freedom of her unjustly imprisoned betrothed. 100 min. Pueblerina. 1948. In arguably Fernández's last great achievement in the epic, folkloric style that made him an international figure, a peasant couple face the evil landowners who have forced them from their farm. 105 min. Sun, Mar 4, 1:30; Sun, Mar 11, 4:30



Salón México. 1948. In Fernández's hands, the sordid Mexico City dance hall in which the self-sacrificing heroine works to support her virtuous younger sister becomes a glorious symbol of Mexican communal solidarity, as the cabaret girl joins with an idealistic policeman to defeat a brutal gangster. 95 min.

Víctimas del pecado (Victims of Sin). 1950. Fernández embraced the emerging genre of rumberas—cabaret melodramas centered on Afro-Caribbean music—fashioning this showcase for its greatest star, the incandescent Ninón Sevilla. 85 min. Mon, Mar 5, 5:00; Sat, Mar 10, 2:00

El rincón de las vírgenes (Nest of Virgins). 1972. Written and directed by Alberto Isaac. As fashions changed and the economics of Mexican cinema constricted, Fernández returned to his acting career in the late 1950s. In this rollicking folk comedy, he plays a fradulent healer who travels the countryside with his fast-talking partner. 98 min. Mon, Mar 5, 7:30; Sat. Mar 10, 4:30

Bring Me the Head of Alfredo Garcia. 1974. Mexico/USA. Directed by Sam Peckinpah. In his final personal film, shot in Mexico with a largely Mexican crew, Peckinpah cast his old friend Fernández as the gang boss who issues the command of the title. 112 min. Tue, Mar 6, 7:30; Sun, Mar 11, 1:30

Mar 1-Apr 27 Modern Matinees: Delmer Daves and H. C. Potter

While they may not be household names, Delmer Daves and H. C. Potter were essential contract directors for MGM and RKO Pictures, respectively. Daves was celebrated in particular for thoughtful Westerns, while Potter showed an uncanny deftness with "gag" comedies. All films are from the US.

Beloved Enemy. 1936. Directed by H. C. Potter. In the wake of a 1921 bombing in Dublin, a dedicated Irish republican falls in love with Lady Helen Drummond—whose father is leading the peace talks on behalf of Great Britain. 90 min.
