MoMA and Japan Society pay tribute to the most influential cinematographer of postwar Japanese cinema, Kazuo Miyagawa (1908–1999), with a jointly organized, careerspanning retrospective. All films are from Japan.

Oshidori utagassen (Singing Lovebirds). 1939. Directed by Masahiro Makino. This breezy musical comedy about a *ronin* and three coquettish suitors was billed as "the rare operetta in which jazz bursts into the period film." 69 min. Fri, Apr 13, 4:30; Sat, Apr 14, 1:30

Te o tsunagu kora (Children Hand in Hand). 1948. Directed by Hiroshi Inagaki. A heartbreaking portrait of childhood kindness and cruelty, centering on a small-town boy with a learning disability who attempts to fit in with his classmates. 86 min.

### Benten Kozō (The Gay

Masquerade). 1958. Directed by Daisuke Ito. This classic kabuki spin on the Robin Hood legend is done up in spectacularly colorful widescreen fashion by Ito, a pioneer of the *jidaigeki* (period drama), and Miyagawa. 86 min. Sat, Apr 14, 7:00; Sun, Apr 15, 1:30

Nishijin no shimai (Sisters of Nishijin). 1952. Directed by Kozaburo Yoshimura. A melodrama set in Kyoto's fading textile district, where a family of weavers is faced with possible ruin after their father commits suicide. 110 min. Sun, Apr 15, 4:00; Tue, Apr 17, 4:30

Shin Heike monogatari (Tales of the Taira Clan). 1955. Directed by Kenji Mizoguchi. Mizoguchi's penultimate film is a beautiful, austere chronicle of a civil war among warrior clans of aristocratic heritage at the end of the 12th century. 108 min.

Akasen chitai (Street of Shame). 1956. Directed by Kenji Mizoguchi. Mizoguchi's swan song is a tragic portrait of five women working at the Dreamland brothel in Tokyo's red light district. 87 min. Mon, Apr 16, 4:30

**Ugetsu.** 1953. Directed by Kenji Mizoguchi. Mizoguchi's towering achievement is a haunting, decorous fable about the illusory nature of desire, set during the civil wars of Japan's 16th century. 94 min. Mon, Apr 16, 7:00

Yojimbo. 1961. Directed by Akira Kurosawa. This oft remade classic stars Toshiro Mifune as the itinerant samurai who rids a town of two criminal gangs by pitting them against each other. 110 min. Wed, Apr 18, 4:30

Rashomon. 1950. Directed by Akira Kurosawa. In Kurosawa's timeless, much-imitated allegory about the illusion of truth, Miyagawa pushed the possibilities of cinematographic expression. 88 min. Wed, Apr 18, 7:00 Echizen take-ningyô (Bamboo Doll of Echizen). 1963. Directed by Kozaburo Yoshimura. A lonely geisha finds comfort and companionship in the arms of her lover's son in this brooding melodrama of forbidden desire, guilt, and betrayal. 103 min. Thu, Apr 19. 7:30: Sat. Apr 21, 1:30

Enjō (Conflagration). 1958. Directed by Kon Ichikawa. An adaptation of one of Japan's most important 20th-century novels, about a tormented young acolyte who burned Kyoto's ancient Zen temple of the Golden Pavilion to the ground. 99 min. Fri. Apr 20, 4:30; Sat. Apr 21, 7:00

Otōto (Her Brother). 1960. Directed by Kon Ichikawa. A lonely young woman is pressured by her severe, ailing stepmother into sacrificing herself to the needs of her profligate brother. 98 min. Fri, Apr 20, 7:00; Sat, Apr 21, 4:00

Suzakumon. 1957. Directed by Kazuo Mori. Mori and Miyagawa won the prestigious Asia-Pacific prize in 1957 for this sumptuous melodrama about aristocratic star-crossed love. 100 min. Sun, Apr 22, 2:00; Tue, Apr 24, 7:00

Reminiscence. 1953. Directed by Kozaburo Yoshimura. The quietly devastating story of a young man, orphaned during the war, who stumbles into a passionate yet tragic relationship with his late father's mistress and her daughter. 110 min.

Kagi (Odd Obsession). 1959. Directed by Kon Ichikawa. Pauline Kael describes the film, about an old man's impotence and sexual deviance, as "a beautifully stylized and highly original piece of filmmaking—perverse in the best sense of the word...." 107 min. Mon, Apr 23, 7:15

Yari no gonza (Gonza the Spearman). 1986. Directed by Masahiro Shinoda. Shinoda's late-period drama of adulterous lovers uses the exquisitely restrained ritual of the tea ceremony to evoke the fragile social order of the Tokugawa shogunate. 126 min.

### Irezumi (The Spider Tattoo).

1966. Directed by Yasuzo Masumura. A young woman is sold to a geisha house and branded with a spider tattoo, giving her a supernatural thirst for vengeance against men.

Chinmoku (Silence). 1971. Directed by Masahiro Shinoda. In this adaptation of Shushaku Endo's novel, two Portuguese Jesuit missionaries are tortured into committing apostasy in early 17th-century Japan. 129 min. Thu, Apr 26, 4:30; Sun, Apr 29, 1:30

Hanare goze Orin (Ballad of Orin). 1977. Directed by Masahiro Shinoda. One of the most sublime color films ever made follows the hardscrabble life of a wandering outcast goze (blind female musician) in early 20th-century Japan. 117 min. Thu, Apr 26, 7:30

Zatōichi senryō-kubi (Zatoichi and the Chest of Gold). 1964. Directed by Kazuo Ikehiro. In this sixth installment of the popular Zatoichi film series, the blind swordsman is wrongly accused of stealing from poor villagers and sets out to find the actual thieves. 82 min. Fri, Apr 27, 4:30

Aru koroshiya (A Certain Killer). 1967. Directed by Kazuo Mori. This stylish crime thriller follows a nihilistic ex-kamikaze pilot turned restaurateur who moonlights as a contract killer for the *yakuza*. 82 min. Fri, Apr 27, 7:15.

Oni no sumu yakata (The Devil's Temple). 1969. Directed by Kenji Misumi. This chamber drama, set among the evil spirits of medieval Japan, is an underappreciated masterpiece of operatic emotions, visual flamboyance, and claustrophobic mise en scène. 76 min. Sat, Apr 28, 4:00

#### Tōkyō Orinpikku (Tokyo

Olympiad). 1965. Directed by Kon Ichikawa. Director Kon Ichikawa furnished cinematographer Miyagawa and his team of 164 assistants with more than 100 cameras and nearly 250 lenses to cover every angle of the 1964 Olympic Games. 170 min.

Dene wos guet geit (Those Who Are Fine). 2017. Switzerland. Directed by Cyril Schäublin. This razor-sharp satire uses Zurich's grey concrete architecture, clipped exchanges between urbanites, and even a dash of sci-fi-esque atmospherics to portray a fractured dystopia. 71 min. Sat, Apr 7, 1:45

Drift. 2017. Germany. Directed by Helena Wittmann. Two women spend a weekend together on the North Sea, taking long walks on the beach and stopping at snack stands; when they separate, the film gives way to a delicate meditation on the poetics of space. 96 min. Sat, Apr 7, 4:00

**Notes on an Appearance.** 2018. USA. Directed by Ricky D'Ambrose.

When a quiet young man mysteriously disappears, distraught friends search for him with the help of notebooks, letters, and other tiny clues. 60 min. Young Girls Vanish (Des jeunes filles disparaissent). 2017. France. Directed by Clément Pinteaux. In Essonne, France, young women begin mysteriously disappearing. 16 min. Sat, Apr 7, 6:30

Delmer Daves and H. C. Potter

While they may not be household names, Delmer Daves and H. C. Potter were essential contract directors for MGM and RKO Pictures, respectively. Daves was celebrated in particular for thoughtful Westerns, while Potter showed an uncanny deftness with "gag" comedies. All films are from the US.

**Dark Passage.** 1947. Written and directed by Delmer Daves. A falsely convicted wife murderer is set to escape San Quentin in a

garbage truck—until a radio announcement thwarts his plans. 106 min. Wed, Apr 4, 1:30

The Last Wagon. 1956. Directed by Delmer Daves. While seeking revenge for the murder of his wife and children, "Comanche" Todd survives an Apache attack, only to find himself responsible for a group of teenagers. 98 min. Thu, Apr 5, 1:30

Beloved Enemy. 1936. Directed by H. C. Potter. In the wake of a 1921 bombing in Dublin, a dedicated Irish republican falls in love with the daughter of the man leading the peace talks on behalf of Britain. 90 min. Fri, Apr 6, 1:30

The Story of Vernon and Irene Castle. 1939. Directed by H. C. Potter. Ginger Rogers and Fred Astaire star as the famous dancing couple. 93 min. Wed, Apr 11, 1:30

Destination Tokyo. 1943. Directed by Delmer Daves. Made two years after Pearl Harbor, Destination Tokyo follows a secret submarine mission to Japan. 135 min. Thu, Apr 12, 1:30

The Cowboy and the Lady. 1938. Directed by H. C. Potter. A romantic comedy about a society girl, Mary, whose father is running for President. 91 min. Fri, Apr 13, 1:30

**3:10 to Yuma.** 1957. Directed by Delmer Daves. Desperate to save his failing ranch, Dan Evans takes on the impossible task of escorting a dangerous convicted criminal to the 3:10 train to Yuma. 92 min. Wed, Apr 18, 1:30

Kings Go Forth. 1958. Directed by Delmer Daves. Late in WWII, soldiers Sam and Britt meet Monique in the South of France. Monique melts Sam's by-thebook heart—until he finds out her family's secret. 109 min.

Three for the Show. 1955. Directed by H. C. Potter. Julie and Vernon are saying farewell to Broadway for a much-anticipated vacation. But the sudden appearance of Julie's ex-husband might cause a delay—especially since he was presumed dead.

Mr. Blandings Builds His Dream House. USA. Directed by H. C. Potter. In this screwball classic, the Blandings ditch their cramped New York City apartment to build a dream home in Connecticut. But their dream soon becomes a comic nightmare. 94 min. Wed, Apr 25, 1:30

A Summer Place. 1959. Written and directed by Delmer Daves. A summer soap opera at its very best! Generations of romance and changing fortunes surround a grand home on Maine's Pine Island. 130 min. Thu, Apr 26, 1:30
