The Birds. 1963. The avian world declares war on the human inhabitants of the northern California town of Bodega Bay. 119 min. Wed, May 2, 1:30

Saboteur. 1942. "A young worker in a munitions factory is wrongly accused of sabotage.... Not too different from most of your manhunt yarns, so the best way to recall this one is to mention the finale on top of the Statue of Liberty" (Francois Truffaut). 109 min. Thu, May 3, 1:30

Blackmail. 1929. Great Britain. "Well, the silent pictures were the purest form of cinema; the only thing they lacked was the sound of people talking and the noises" (Alfred Hitchcock). 75 min.

Fri, May 4, 1:30

Notorious. 1946. Cary Grant recruits a reluctant Ingrid Bergman to infiltrate a Nazi spy ring. 101 min. Wed, May 9, 1:30

The Paradine Case. 1947. "Let's go over more of the apparent flaws of that picture. First of all, I don't think that Gregory Peck can properly represent an English lawyer" (Alfred Hitchcock). 114 min. Thu, May 10, 1:30

Rebecca. 1940. The new wife of a wealthy widower is trapped in the shadow of her predecessor. 130 min. Fri. May 11, 1:30

Spellbound. 1945. A dedicated psychoanalyst (Ingrid Bergman) attempts to help an amnesiac could-be murderer (Gregory Peck). 111 min. Wed, May 16, 1:30

Suspicion. 1941. Joan Fontaine discovers that her new husband (Cary Grant) is a gambler, a swindler, and possibly a murderer. 100 min. Thu, May 17, 1:30

Torn Curtain. 1966. "I got the idea from the disappearance of the two British diplomats, Burgess and MacLean, who deserted their own country and went to Russia" (Alfred Hitchcock). 128 min. Fri. May 18, 1:30

Psycho. 1960. The proprietor of a remote roadside motel engages in some rather disturbing extracurricular activities.

109 min. Wed, May 23, 1:30

Ladri di biciclette (Bicycle Thieves). 1948. Italy. Directed by Vittorio De Sica. "On seeing *The Bicycle Thief*, for instance, [a critic is] likely to think this is just the sort of thing he might have written himself, but that thought couldn't possibly occur to him in

connection with *North by Northwest*" (Francois Truffaut).
90 min. Thu. May 24, 1:30

The Grapes of Wrath. 1940. Directed by John Ford. Though Hitchcock's *Rebecca* won the 1941 Best Picture Oscar, Best Director went to John Ford for this film. Hitchcock never won the statue for directing. 129 min. Fri, May 25, 1:30

Rear Window. 1954. Convinced he has witnessed a neighbor's murder, a wheelchair-bound photojournalist (James Stewart) enlists his girlfriend (Grace Kelly) in an attempt to expose the killer. 112 min. Wed, May 30, 1:30

Sunnyside Up. 1929. Directed by David Butler. This musical propelled silent-screen lovers Janet Gaynor and Charles Farrell into the sound era and became a runaway hit of the early talkies. 121 min. Fri, May 18, 4:30

7th Heaven. 1927. Directed by Frank Borzage. Janet Gaynor and Charles Farrell are one of the great screen couples in Borzage's strongest expression of the transcendent power of romantic love. Fri, May 18, 7:30

Romance of the Underworld.

1928. Directed by Irving Cummings. Country girl Mary Astor is lured into a life of prostitution in the big city. When upstanding John Boles promises to take her away from all this, her former pimp threatens blackmail. 68 min. Sat, May 19, 1:30

Dressed to Kill. 1928. Directed by Irving Cummings. In this stylish underworld romance, the upscale burglary ring of "Mile-Away Barry" is threatened when he falls hard for a dubious dame. 80 min. Sat, May 19, 4:00

The Mad Game. 1933. Directed by Irving Cummings. Spencer Tracy plays a bootlegger who refuses to switch to kidnapping babies when Prohibition ends. 73 min. Sat, May 19, 6:30; Wed, May 30, 4:30

Fig Leaves. 1926. Directed by Howard Hawks. Hawks's second film already displays his comic flair and formal invention, beginning in the Garden of Eden and flashing forward to a contemporary New York tale. 70 min. Sun, May 20, 1:30

Fazil. 1928. Directed by Howard Hawks. This romance is a riot of miscasting, with all-American Charles Farrell as a moody Arab prince and Swedish bombshell Greta Nissen as the elegant Parisienne who loves him. 75 min.

Paid to Love. 1927. Directed by Howard Hawks. American banker J. Farrell MacDonald tries to bring financial stability to a Balkan kingdom by finding a suitable girlfriend for the country's shy prince (George O'Brien). 76 min. Sun, May 20, 7:00

Call Her Savage. 1932. Directed by John Francis Dillion. Clara Bow brings natural charm to the story of a "hot-blooded" daughter of a Texas oil baron, terrorizing Chicago and New York with her sexual indiscretions. 92 min. Mon, May 21, 4:30

Hoop-La. 1933. Directed by Frank Lloyd. In Clara Bow's final film, she's a carnival dancer who accepts \$100 from a colleague to seduce their boss's innocent son. 85 min. Mon, May 21, 7:30

Caravan. 1934. Directed by Erik Charrell. The greatest Weimar musical not made in Germany is also one of Hollywood's earliest coded protests against Hitler. 101 min. Tue, May 22, 4:30

I Am Suzanne! 1933. Directed by Rowland V. Lee. When an ingénue is cast off by her Svengali-like manager, the puppeteer who loves her from afar provides a marionette surrogate. 98 min.

Transatlantic. 1931. Directed by William K. Howard. Multiple stories intersect aboard an ocean liner in this major rediscovery, featuring deep-focus cinematography by James Wong Howe. 78 min. Wed, May 23, 4:30

Sherlock Holmes. 1932. Directed by William K. Howard. Perhaps the most rousing and stylistically adventurous of all Holmes movies. 69 min. Wed, May 23, 7:00

The First Year. 1926. Directed by Frank Borzage. A comedy about a young Midwestern couple struggling to survive the inevitable disappointments of the first year of marriage. 75 min. Bad Girl. 1931. Directed by Frank Borzage. Borzage's Depressionera hit was the first of six films featuring Sally Eilers and James Dunn, the first great romantic couple of the sound era. 90 min. Thu, May 24, 7:00

Hat Check Girl. 1932. Directed by Sidney Lanfield. Sally Eilers lands the hatcheck concession at a swanky night club, only to get mixed up with a bootlegging boss, a blackmailing gossip columnist, and a socialite with designs on her virtue. 75 min. Fri, May 25, 4:30

The Red Dance. 1928. Directed by Raoul Walsh. The Russian Revolution propels a humble peasant girl to fame as a dancer, while she secretly maintains her love for the deposed grand duke she was once ordered to kill. 103 min. Sat, May 26, 1:30

Women of All Nations. 1931. Directed by Raoul Walsh. Edmund Lowe and Victor McLaglen return as the hardfightin', hard-drinkin', and hard-lovin' Marines Quirt and Flagg. 72 min. Sat, May 26, 4:30

Wild Girl. 1932. Directed by Raoul Walsh. Joan Bennett plays frontier tomboy Salomy Jane, awakening to her sexuality in Walsh's zesty adaptation of a popular 19th-century stage play. 78 min. Sat, May 26, 7:00

Sharp Shooters. 1928. Directed by John G. Blystone. George O'Brien is a sailor with the archetypical girl in every port until he meets a determined Lois Moran in Morocco. 60 min.

East Side, West Side. 1927.
Directed by Allan Dwan. A true
New York City epic, starring
George O'Brien as a celebrated
prizefighter engaged to the ward
of a Park Avenue millionaire but
still in love with his childhood
sweetheart. 90 min.

City Girl. 1930. Directed by F. W. Murnau. A naïve young farmer falls for a hard-boiled city waitress and brings her back home, where they face intolerance, envy, and a devastating hailstorm. 89 min.

Directed by Alfred L. Werker.
When a plague of "masculitis"
leaves him the last male on Earth,
Brazilian matinee idol Raúl

highest bidder. 69 min.
