Anand Patwardhan (b. 1950) has secured a reputation for being among India's most independent and fearless filmmakers. In his award-winning Jai Bhim Comrade, a 1997 police shooting of Dalits (formerly branded "untouchables") in Mumbai triggers a story about caste discrimination in contemporary India, and the poetry and music of resistance.

Celebrated Argentine author and filmmaker Edgardo Cozarinsky presents a Carte Blanche selection that juxtaposes classic and contemporary Argentine films in fresh and provocative

Las aguas bajan turbias (Dark River). 1952. Directed by Hugo del Carril. "A unique example of social cinema during the Perón era, Dark River imagines the creation of a union of exploited workers in the mate plantations in the Argentinian northeast." 92 min.

Players vs. ángeles caídos (Players vs. Fallen Angels).

1968. Written and directed by Alberto Fischerman. "Players vs. Fallen Angels seemed like a bolt out of the blue when it played to mostly underground audiences in 1968—many of the cast and crew ended up disappeared during the Pinochet regime—and even today, it remains grippingly experimental and urgent to young filmmakers." 84 min. El vampiro negro (The Black Vampire). 1952. Directed by Román Viñoly Barreto. This series, drawn primarily from MoMA's collection, includes an array of films discussed in the 1967 book *Hitchcock/Truffaut*, collecting François Truffaut's exhaustive interviews with Alfred Hitchcock. All films are from the US and directed by Hitchcock, unless otherwise noted. From June 26 through July 4, we also present a special "fashionably late" program of selections from this series for those who are unable to attend weekday afternoon screenings.

To Catch a Thief. 1955. Grace Kelly falls under the spell of a suave jewel thief (Cary Grant) on the prowl in the South of France. 106 min. Fri, Jun 1, 1:30; Thu, Jun 28, 1:30

Jules et Jim (Jules and Jim). 1962. France. Directed by Francois Truffaut. Hitchcock on Jules and Jim: "At one point, when one of the characters jumps out of a window, the story stops. Then a title reading 'some time later' flashes across the screen.... Now, that may be good and correct in its way, but in the genre of the suspense story, it would be absolutely inadmissible."

Rebecca. 1940. The new wife of a wealthy widower is trapped in the shadow of her predecessor. 130 min. Thu, Jun 7, 1:30; Sat, Jun 30, 4:30

Psycho. 1960. The proprietor of a remote roadside motel engages in some rather disturbing extracurricular activities.

Suspicion. 1941. Joan Fontaine discovers that her new husband (Cary Grant) is a gambler, a swindler, and possibly a murderer. 100 min.

Spellbound. 1945. A dedicated psychoanalyst (Ingrid Bergman) attempts to help an amnesiac could-be murderer (Gregory Peck). 111 min. Fri, Jun 15, 1:30; Sat, Jun 30, 7:30

The Night of the Hunter. 1955. Directed by Charles Laughton. Truffaut describes the film to Hitchcock: "The word love was tattooed on one of [Robert Mitchum's] hands and the word hate on the other. His sermon consisted in a sort of pathetic struggle between the two hands. It was quite effective. When I saw that, it occurred to me that your pictures also describe the conflict between good and evil." 92 min. Wed, Jun 20, 1:30

Torn Curtain. 1966. "I got the idea from the disappearance of the two British diplomats, Burgess and MacLean, who deserted their own country and went to Russia." (Alfred Hitchcock). 128 min.

The Paradine Case. 1947. "Let's go over more of the apparent flaws of that picture. First of all, I don't think that Gregory Peck can properly represent an English lawyer" (Alfred Hitchcock). 114 min. Fri, Jun 22, 1:30; Fri, Jun 29, 4:00

The Birds. 1963. The avian world declares war on the human inhabitants of the northern California town of Bodega Bay. 119 min. Tue, Jun 26, 7:00

Notorious. 1946. Cary Grant recruits a reluctant Ingrid Bergman to infiltrate a Nazi spy ring. 101 min. Wed, Jun 27, 1:30; Thu, Jun 28, 4:00 Saboteur. 1942. "A young worker in a munitions factory is wrongly accused of sabotage.... Not too different from most of your manhunt yarns, so the best way to recall this one is to mention the finale on top of the Statue of Liberty" (Francois Truffaut).

This series features recent restorations—many exceedingly rare—from the Fox collection by MoMA and the UCLA Film and Television Archive. All films are from the US.

The Brat. 1931. Directed by John Ford. A Park Avenue novelist (Alan Dinehart) fishes a street urchin (Sally O'Neil) out of a Lower East Side night court to serve as a model for a character in his new book. 67 min.

One More Spring. 1935. Directed by Henry King. In this gently uplifting comedy, a shed in Central Park becomes a shelter against the raging Depression for a group of assorted outcasts. 87 min. Fri, Jun 1, 7:00; Mon, Jun 4, 4:30

7th Heaven. 1927. Directed by Frank Borzage. Janet Gaynor and Charles Farrell are one of the great screen couples in Borzage's strongest expression of the transcendent power of romantic love. Sat. Jun 2. 1:30

Sunnyside Up. 1929. Directed by David Butler. This musical propelled silent-screen lovers Janet Gaynor and Charles Farrell into the sound era and became a runaway hit of the early talkies. 121 min. Sat, Jun 2, 4:30

Tess of the Storm Country.
1932. Directed by Alfred Santell.
This third adaptation of Grace
Miller White's novel is a showcase
for Fox's enduring romantic
couple, Janet Gaynor and
Charles Farrell. 82 min.

Sherlock Holmes. 1932. Directed by William K. Howard. Perhaps the most rousing and stylistically adventurous of all Holmes movies. 69 min.

Bad Girl. 1931. Directed by Frank Borzage. Borzage's Depressionera hit was the first of six films featuring Sally Eilers and James Dunn, the first great romantic couple of the sound era. 90 min. Sun, Jun 3, 4:30

Transatlantic. 1931. Directed by William K. Howard. Multiple stories intersect aboard an ocean liner in this major rediscovery, featuring deep-focus cinematography by James Wong Howe. 78 min. Sun, Jun 3,7:00

Caravan. 1934. Directed by Erik Charrell. The greatest Weimar musical not made in Germany is also one of Hollywood's earliest coded protests against Hitler. 101 min. Mon, Jun 4, 7:30

6 Hours to Live. 1932. Directed by Wilhelm (William) Dieterle. An assassinated diplomat, brought back to life by a renegade scientist, has only six hours to find his killer, say farewell to his fiancée, and make a plea for peace. 72 min. Tue, Jun 5, 4:30

Hat Check Girl. 1932. Directed by Sidney Lanfield. Sally Eilers lands the hatcheck concession at a swanky nightclub, only to get mixed up with a bootlegging boss, a blackmailing gossip columnist, and a socialite with designs on her virtue. 75 min. Tue. Jun 5.7:00
