Modern Matinees: Vincent Price

The versatility of Vincent Price (1911–1993)—cad, romantic, adventurer, villain—made him a compelling, if unlikely, leading man. His mischievous raised eyebrows and devilish vocal modulations eventually made him a horror icon. This wideranging overview of Price's career is drawn mainly from MoMA's collection.

The Baron of Arizona. 1950. USA. Written and directed by Samuel Fuller. Fuller's second film—a sterling example of what the filmmaker liked to call "a good yarn"—tells the improbable tale of a land office clerk who spends years of his life laying the groundwork for a fraudulent claim to the entire territory of Arizona. 97 min. The Big Circus. 1959. USA. Directed by Joseph M. Newman. Hank Whirling finally cuts ties with the callous Borman Brothers in order to run his own circus. The bank even floats him a loan, but business hasn't been so good lately...and those mysterious accidents keep happening. 109 min. Thu, Sep 6, 1:30;

Brigham Young. 1940. USA. Directed by Henry Hathaway. Hathaway—whose remarkably long directorial career began in 1930 and concluded in 1974—tells the story of Brigham Young, who became president of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in 1844, after the assassination of founder Joseph Smith, Jr. 114 min. Laura. 1944. USA. Directed by Otto Preminger. Talented illustrator Laura Hunt screws up the courage to ask newspaper columnist Waldo Liedecker to say something positive about the ad she designed that's running in his paper. 88 min. Mon, Sep 12, 1:30; Fri, Sep 28, 1:30

A Royal Scandal. 1945. USA. Directed by Otto Preminger. In Preminger's film, inspired by the play *The Czarina* as inspiration, Empress Catherine the Great falls in love with a young commander of her guards. 94 min. Thu, Sep 13, 1:30



Son of Sinbad. 1955. USA. Directed by Ted Tetzlaff. Sinbad and his buddy Omar Khayyam (Vincent Price) go in search of "Greek Fire," an early form of gunpowder. Exotic dancer and burlesque star Lili St. Cyr dances in a diaphanous outfit, turning the heads of both men when they visit the harem. 91 min.

The Whales of August. 1987. USA. Directed by Lindsay Anderson. During a summer reunion at a family home in Maine, two elderly sisters, one sweet, the other sour, confront the losses and grievances of their long lives. 90 min. Wed, Sep 19, 1:30

Wilson. 1944. USA. Directed by Henry King. New York Times film critic Bosley Crowther called this political biopic a "commanding screen biography of Woodrow Wilson, the twenty-eighth President of the United States." 154 min. Thu, Sep 20, 1:30



The Keys of the Kingdom. 1944. USA. Directed by John M. Stahl. We meet Father Francis Chisholm as an elderly priest whose more traditional sermons no longer pack in the parishioners on Sunday. The new Monsignor is about to ask Chisholm to retire—until he discovers the old man's journals. 137 min.

Leave Her to Heaven. 1945. USA. Directed by John M. Stahl. In Stahl's story of obsessive love and envy, novelist Richard and socialite Ellen meet on a train out West. Ellen already has a fiancé back home, but that mere fact does little to deter her passion for Richard. 110 min.

Since the 1990s, one figure has contributed to the look of Iran's rich, multifaceted, evolving cinema like no other: cinematographer Mahmoud Kalari, who has lensed some of the most acclaimed works by Asghar Farhadi, Abbas Kiarostami, Mohsen Makhmalbaf, and Dariush Mehrjui, to name just a few. Kalari's camera has steadily, over three decades, focused our gaze on Iran.

This stylistic and narrative tour de force uses a single, uninterrupted shot to take the audience on a sinister and hallucinatory walk around a campsite where young kite-flyers don't know what awaits them. 134 min. Gabbeh. 1996. Iran. Written and directed by Mohsen Makhmalbaf. Gabbeh refers to a colorful Persian rug, but it is also the name of a young nomadic woman yearning for love in this enigmatic, dazzlingly beautiful tale. 75 min. Sat, Sep 15, 7:30; Sun, Sep 23, 2:30

The Fish Fall in Love. 2006. Iran. Written and directed by Ali Raffi. After a two-decade absence, a man returns home to the Caspian Sea to find his ex-fiancée running a thriving restaurant on his family estate. 97 min. Sun, Sep 16, 2:30; Fri, Sep 28, 4:30

A Separation. 2011. Iran. Written and directed by Asghar Farhadi. What first appears to be a divorce drama develops into a piercing, complex text on gender, class, religion, truth, and all that makes up life in modern Iran. Winner of the Academy Award and the Golden Globe for best foreignlanguage film. 123 min.

A Moment of Innocence. 1996. Iran. Written and directed by Mohsen Makhmalbaf. When Makhmalbaf was a radical teenager before the Islamic Revolution, he stabbed a Shah police officer and was sent to jail. Real life and fiction collide in this witty reconstruction of the two-decade-old incident. 78 min.

Offside. 2006. Iran. Directed by Jafar Panahi. How far will Iranian female soccer fans go to gain entrance to a stadium off-limits to women? The humorous tricks they deploy are in sharp contrast to the very real repression they suffer. 93 min. Tue, Sep 18, 7:00; Sun, Sep 30, 2:30

The Wind Will Carry Us. 1999. Iran. Directed by Abbas Kiarostami. As an old woman lies in her deathbed in a remote Kurdish village, a visiting engineer from Tehran observes the majesty of life and nature. 118 min. Fri, Sep 21, 7:30; Thu, Sep 27, 7:00
