# The Unknown Jerry: Home Movies and More from the Jerry Lewis Collection

Jerry Lewis wrote, shot, and directed a series of 16mm films that pushed the definition of "home movies" to its limits, featuring Hollywood actors and fully developed storylines. Newly preserved by the Library of Congress, these early experiments are shown here for the first time in their entirety, along with a selection of Lewis's feature films. All films are from the US and directed by Jerry Lewis.

The Nutty Professor. 1963. In Lewis's masterpiece, a lacerating, self-reflexive variation on Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, a socially inept chemistry professor discovers a formula that transforms him into a smarmy lounge singer. 107 min. Tue, Oct 2, 7:00; Wed, Oct 10, 7:00

The Ladies Man. 1961. In his second film as a director, Lewis was already demonstrating the formal invention that would dazzle the French New Wave, including a romantic subplot that builds to a breathtaking camera movement. 95 min. Wed, Oct 3, 4:00; Tue, Oct 9, 7:00

The Errand Boy. 1961. Lewis essentially treats the Paramount lot as one big prop, allowing his character—a paperhanger hired as a front-office spy—to interact with all the paraphernalia of filmmaking. 92 min. Wed, Oct 3, 7:00; Mon, Oct 8, 7:00

**Come Back Little Shiksa.** 1953. Dean Martin stars as a hard-drinking surgeon who must constantly face the temptation of sobriety. Shown with footage from the film's premiere at Lewis's home. 39 min. (program 60 min.). Fri, Oct 5, 4:00 (introduced by Chris Lewis, Rob Stone); Sun, Oct 7, 5:00

The Re-Inforcer. 1951. Dean Martin is all mobbed up as pinstriped gangster Joe Lasagna in this re-imagining of the 1951 Humphrey Bogart starrer *The Enforcer.* Shown with footage of the film's premiere at Lewis's home. 45 min. (program 60 min.). Fri, Oct 5, 7:00 (introduced by Chris Lewis, Rob Stone); Tue, Oct 9, 4:00

Fairfax Avenue. 1951. Janet Leigh stars in what an elaborate title sequence identifies as "the Jewish *Sunset Boulevard.*" Shown with the short *An Eye for an Eye*, with Leigh and Tony Curtis, and a selection of *Fairfax Avenue* outtakes. 30 min. (program 60 min.). Sat, Oct 6, 1:00 (introduced by Chris Lewis, Rob Stone); Mon, Oct 8, 4:00

# The Making of Gar-Ron

**Productions.** 1951–56. This program will show outtakes, field trips, and incomplete films from the Gar-Ron gang, concluding with the complete short film A *Spot in the Shade*, featuring Tony Curtis, Janet Leigh, Patti Lewis, and Mona Freeman. 60 min. Sat, Oct 6, 4:00; Wed, Oct 10, 4:00

Gar-Ron Productions Screen Tests. 1951–56. Anticipating Andy Warhol by a decade, Jerry Lewis would often subject visitors to his home to "screen tests." Also in the program are Jerry's first actual screen test, for the 1949 *My Friend Irma*, and some tests made during the 1960s. The program concludes with the short *Nightmare*, with Tony Curtis and Janet Leigh. Sat, Oct 6, 7:00; Thu, Oct 11, 7:00

The Bellboy. 1960. The link between the home movies and Lewis's professional career as a director was this, his first feature, made on the cuff while Lewis was performing at the Fontainebleau Hotel in Miami Beach. 72 min. Sun, Oct 7, 2:00; Thu, Oct 11, 4:00

# Oct 12–18 Hammer Horror: A Frankenstein Septet

Beginning in 1957, the British production company Hammer Films produced seven Frankenstein films, focusing on the Gothic aspects of the novel and the obsession, ambition, and guilt of the doctor (usually played by Peter Cushing). These films overflow with garish Victorian décor and costumes, lusty characters, and decidedly more disfigured, wrathful monsters. All films are from Great Britain.

#### The Curse of Frankenstein.

1957. Directed by Terence Fisher. In the first of Hammer's Frankenstein films, the imprisoned doctor tells his life story to a priest, in the hope that he will be absolved of his sins. The film's lurid color, occasional gore, and discomfiting Gothic trappings build an atmosphere of uneasiness. 82 min. Fri, Oct 12, 7:00; Mon, Oct 15, 7:00

#### The Revenge of Frankenstein.

1958. Directed by Terence Fisher. After narrowly escaping his own execution at the guillotine, "Dr. Stein" opens a charity hospital. There's only one hitch with his altruism: he's using the patients to supply his gruesome experiments. 90 min. Sat, Oct 13, 1:00; Tue, Oct 16, 7:00

### The Evil of Frankenstein. 1964.

Directed by Freddie Francis. Baron Frankenstein finds his creature frozen in a block of ice and is intent on bringing him back to life. All he needs is a suitable new brain. 84 min. Sat, Oct 13, 4:00

**Frankenstein Created Woman.** 1967. Directed by Terence Fisher. First Frankenstein's wrongly accused assistant, Hans, is executed. Then the boy's girlfriend, Christina, commits suicide. Distraught, Frankenstein implants Hans's brain in Christina's body. But when Hans's thirst for justice floats to the surface, "Christina" becomes a killing machine. 86 min. Sat, Oct 13, 7:00; Thu, Oct 18, 4:00

### Frankenstein Must Be

**Destroyed.** 1969. Directed by Terence Fisher. Even more self-obsessed than usual, Baron Frankenstein resorts to blackmail in order to see his unholy experiments through to fruition no matter who gets hurt in the process. 98 min. Sun, Oct 14, 1:00; Wed, Oct 17, 7:00

#### The Horror of Frankenstein.

1970. Directed by Jimmy Sangster. In the sixth Hammer Frankenstein film, more a parody of the series than a sequel, a spoiled young Victor murders his father, impregnates his girlfriend, and creates a monster that (surprise!) goes on a murderous tear. 95 min. Sun, Oct 14, 4:00

# Frankenstein and the Monster

from Hell. 1974. Directed by Terence Fisher. The old gang— Fisher, John Elder, and Peter Cushing—is reunited in this final Hammer Frankenstein offering, which *New York Times* film critic Vincent Canby called "foolish but fun in quite respectable ways." Uncut UK version. 99 min. Wed, Oct 17, 4:00; Thu, Oct 18, 7:00

# <sub>Oct 19-25</sub> Karpo Godina

For more than 30 years, Yugoslav filmmaker Karpo Godina has brought a playfully anarchical spirit to the poetics and politics of film, moving breathlessly between fiction and nonfiction in his avant-garde shorts of the 1960s and '70s and his feature films of the 1980s and '90s. All films are from Yugoslavia and directed by Karpo Godina, unless otherwise noted.

# Experimental Black-and-White Shorts, 1965–67

Having languished under his bed for nearly 50 years, Karpo Godina's earliest 8mm shorts (five of which are presented in this screening) are a revelation. Program 47 min. Fri, Oct 19, 4:00 (introduced by Karpo Godina); Mon, Oct 22, 6:15

In 1970 Godina shot footage of farmers and folkloric customs for an unfinished documentary. In 2013 his former student Ivanišin revisited these villagers to discover what became of them. 50 min. #### Okupacija u 26 slika (Occupation in 26 Pictures).

1978. Directed by Lordan Zafranović. Cinematography by Karpo Godina. Exquisitely photographed by Godina, this variation on Pier Paolo Pasolini's Salò, or the 120 Days of Sodom is a portrait of life in Dubrovnik under Italian occupation during World War II. 116 min.

# Splav Meduze (The Raft of

Medusa). 1980. Godina's debut feature imagines an affecting footnote in the history of the newly invented Yugoslavia of the 1920s, when Serbian Dadaists and Surrealists encountered peasant communities still recovering from the devastation of World War I. 100 min. Sat, Oct 20, 7:30 (introduced by Karpo Godina); Wed, Oct 24, 4:00

### Rdeči boogie ali Kaj ti je deklica (Red Boogie). 1982. Set in the 1950s, the film follows a group of Slovenian musicians who are "corrupted" by jazz and other forms of Western decadence and shunted off to the remote provinces as punishment. 84 min. Sun, Oct 21, 2:30 (introduced by Karpo Godina); Wed, Oct 24, 7:00

# Umetni raj (Artificial Paradise).

1990. Artificial Paradise portrays the surprising creative friendship between a young Fritz Lang, vacationing in Slovenia at the end of World War I, and Karol Gatnik, who was responsible for making some of the very first moving images in the region. 102 min. Sun, Oct 21, 5:00 (introduced by Karpo Godina); Thu, Oct 25, 4:00

# Oct 25–Nov 10 Catalan Cinema's Radical Years, 1968–1978

This series traces 10 revolutionary years in the history of Catalan cinema: the transitional period between 1968 and 1978, when the fate of Spain—and Catalonia's place in it—lay in the balance. Film descriptions are adapted from text by Esteve Riambau. All films are from Catalonia.

Largo viaje hacia la ira (Long Journey into Anger). 1969. Directed by Llorenç Soler. 26 min. El campo es para el hombre (The Lands Are for the Common Man). 1973. Directed by Helena Lumbreras, Mariano Lisa. 50 min. Two documentaries portray land disputes, labor exploitation, and the experiences of immigrants from other regions of Spain. # La respuesta/M'enterro en els fonaments (The Answer).

1969/1976. Written and directed by Josep Maria Forn. *The Answer* is the fierce portrait of a leftist student who betrays his girlfriend in order to kill a rich man with high political influence. 82 min. Sat, Oct 27, 1:30 (introduced by Esteve Riambau); Wed, Oct 31, 4:00

Lock Out. 1973. Written and directed by Antoni Padrós. Sexually and politically dissatisfied, four outcasts take refuge in a garbage dump in this merciless satire of Francoism and the pipe dreams of the revolutionary counterculture. 127 min. Sat, Oct 27, 4:00 (introduced by Esteve Riambau)

#### La ciutat cremada (The Burned

**City).** 1976. Directed by Antoni Ribas. The first film released in Catalan after Franco's death, *The Burned City* centers on a bourgeois family dragged into a bloody confrontation between the Spanish army and the working classes of Barcelona in July 1909. 156 min.

Informe general sobre algunas cuestiones de interés para una proyección pública (General Report). 1976. # Through Oct 31 Modern Matinees: Vincent Price

The versatility of Vincent Price (1911–1993)—cad, romantic, adventurer, villain—made him a compelling, if unlikely, leading man. His mischievous raised eyebrows and devilish vocal modulations eventually made him a horror icon. This wideranging overview of Price's career is drawn mainly from MoMA's collection. All films are from the US.

# The Masque of the Red Death.

1964. Directed by Roger Corman. An evil prince who does nothing to help peasants succumbing to the plague is visited by a mysterious figure during his grand masked ball. 89 min. Wed, Oct 3, 1:30; Thu, Oct 18, 1:30

A Royal Scandal. 1945. Directed by Otto Preminger. In Preminger's film, inspired by the play *The Czarina* as inspiration, Empress Catherine the Great falls in love with a young commander of her guards. 94 min. Thu, Oct 4, 1:30

Edward Scissorhands. 1990. Directed by Tim Burton. An artificial boy with scissors for hands (Johnny Depp) is warmly welcomed in a suburban neighborhood—until he starts messing with their shrubbery. 105 min. Fri, Oct 5, 1:30

House of Usher. 1960. Directed by Roger Corman. Under the influence of an antediluvian family curse, Roderick Usher buries his catatonic sister alive. 79 min. Wed, Oct 10, 1:30

The Keys of the Kingdom. 1944. Directed by John M. Stahl. We meet Father Francis Chisholm as an elderly priest whose more traditional sermons no longer pack in the parishioners on Sunday. The new Monsignor is about to ask Chisholm to retire until he discovers the old man's journals. 137 min. Thu, Oct 11, 1:30

Dragonwyck. 1946. Written and directed by Joseph L. Mankiewicz. Alfred Newman's haunting score sets the precise emotional and psychological tone for Mankiewicz's Gothic romance, set in a large, ghostly mansion. 103 min. Fri, Oct 12, 1:30; Wed, Oct 24, 1:30

**The Fly.** 1958. Directed by Kurt Neumann. Andre's experiments with teleportation were going perfectly—until a common housefly joined him in his contraption, and the result emerged part Andre, part fly. 94 min. Wed, Oct 17, 1:30 House of Wax. 1953. Directed by André De Toth. After a mysterious yearlong disappearance, Jarrod returns to his wax museum with a very atypical technique for creating wax figures. 88 min. Fri, Oct 19, 1:30 (2-D version); Wed, Oct 31, 1:30 (3-D version)

The Pit and the Pendulum. 1961. USA. Directed by Roger Corman. Is Nicholas going mad, or did he actually bury his wife Catherine alive? Is it just his imagination, or does he hear her trying to claw out of her premature tomb? 85 min. Thu, Oct 25, 1:30

Return of the Fly. 1959. USA. Written and directed by Edward L. Bernds. Despite the grisly insect-related mishap that claimed his father's life, Philippe wants to move ahead with dad's teleportation experiments. 80 min. Fri, Oct 26, 1:30
