In 1964, 14 years after his film debut, Sidney Poitier became the first African American to win the Academy Award for Best Actor, for Lilies of the Field, and three years later the incredible three-film run of Guess Who's Coming to Dinner, To Sir, with Love, and In the Heat of the Night made him the biggest box-office draw of 1967. Over the subsequent decades this actor, director, author, diplomat, and humanitarian has earned innumerable awards and honors. from a knighthood to the Presidential Medal of Freedom.
