If Not Us, Who? 2011.

This Is Love, 2009.

Cinematography by Sonja Rom. The stories of Maggie, an alcoholic cop still processing her husband's abandonment, and Chris, a child trafficker obsessed with a nine-year-old, intertwine as Maggie is tasked with interrogating Chris. 111 min.

More Restorations and Rediscoveries from the Fox Film Corporation

Following last summer's program of rarely seen films from the Fox Film Corporation, we're offering another selection of Fox gems from the MoMA vault, including new digital restorations and archival prints not screened in decades. All films are from the US, unless otherwise noted. Silent films have live piano accompaniment.

Street Angel. 1928. Directed by Frank Borzage. After the phenomenal success of 7th Heaven, Fox reunited director Frank Borzage with stars Janet Gaynor and Charles Farrell for this 1928 follow-up, which equals its predecessor in intensity of feeling and spiritual mise-enscène. 102 min. Scotland Yard. 1930. Directed by William K. Howard. Edmund Lowe stars as a grizzled thief—and the industrialist whose identity he assumes thanks to confusion on the battlefields of France and some miraculous plastic surgery. 75 min. Sat, Mar 2, 1:30; Tue. Mar 12, 4:30

Quick Millions. 1931. Directed by Rowland Brown. This strikingly modern gangster film portrays the rise of Danny Raymond (Spencer Tracy) from truck driver to mob boss in a series of blunt, staccato scenes. 70 min. Sat, Mar 2, 3:30; Wed, Mar 13, 7:00; Mon, Mar 25, 6:30

3 Bad Men. 1936. Directed by John Ford. Three eccentric outlaws resolve to protect a young homesteader and her fiancé from the violence surrounding a great Western land rush. 92 min. Sat, Mar 2, 6:00; Wed, Mar 13, 4:30

Zoo in Budapest. 1933. Directed by Rowland V. Lee. A nature boy living on a first-name basis with the animals of the Budapest zoo resolves to rescue an orphan girl so she can join him in his artificial paradise. Silent. 94 min.

Hello, Sister! 1933. Directed by Eric von Stroheim. Fox fired Stroheim from this troubled production, but the film that was eventually released was estimated by scholar Richard Koszarski to be 75 percent Stroheim's work. 61 min.

Outlaws of Red River. 1927.
Directed by Lewis Seiler. B-movie stalwart Lewis Seiler began his directing career with half a dozen of these Tom Mix matinee Westerns, featuring the white-hatted hero and his "Wonder Horse," Tony. Silent. 54 min.

While New York Sleeps. 1920. Directed by Charles J. Brabin. While New York Sleeps offers an unusual three-part structure, with episodes set on Long Island, Times Square, and the East Side, with the same three actors playing very different roles in each. Silent. 88 min.

The Sea Wolf. 1930. Directed by Alfred Santell. Santell's adaptation of Jack London's novel is a technical tour-deforce, as the sound-on-film Movietone system allowed dialogue sequences to be recorded in the open air aboard a ship at sea, 89 min. Mon, Mar 4, 5:30; Sat, Mar 16, 2:00

Kentucky Pride, 1925. Directed by John Ford. The story of a thoroughbred, told largely through the point of view of the horse, who casts her animal gaze on the troubled family of Southern aristocrats who own, sell, and eventually reclaim her. Silent. 71 min. Tue, Mar 5, 4:30; Thu. Mar 21. 7:00

The Shamrock Handicap. 1926. Directed by John Ford. The idyllic Ireland of Ford's imagination makes an early appearance in this silent feature, about a down-on-his-luck breeder forced to sell most of his stable to an American millionaire, Silent, 67 min. Tue, Mar 5, 6:30;

Hangman's House. 1928.

Directed by John Ford. A British army officer returns to his home county disguised as a monk and charged with a secret mission of vengeance, Silent, 71 min. Wed, Mar 6, 4:30; Sun, Mar 17, 4:00

Just Pals. 1920. Directed by John Ford (as Jack Ford). Ford's first film at Fox was this delightful rural comedy about a small-town layabout who rescues an orphan boy thrown from a passing freight train. Silent. 52 min. Wed, Mar 6, 6:30; Sun, Mar 10, 1:30

The Yellow Ticket, 1931.

Directed by Raoul Walsh. In imperial Russia, a Jewish woman applies for a "yellow ticket," granted only to prostitutes, in order to have the freedom to travel and visit her father, who is dying in a dank czarist prison. 86 min. Sun, Mar 3, 6:00; Wed. Mar 20, 4:30

The Red Dance. 1928. Directed by Raoul Walsh. After the runaway hit What Price Glory?, Walsh and Dolores del Rio reunited for this rousing adventure set in the early days

of the Russian Revolution. Silent. 103 min. Sun, Mar 10, 5:30; Fri. Mar 22, 7:00

The Cock-eyed World. 1929. Directed by Raoul Walsh. Marine sergeants Quirt and Flagg continue their rowdy bromance in this first of Walsh's three sequels to his hugely successful What Price Glory? 117 min.

Me and My Gal. 1932. Directed by Raoul Walsh. A notorious flop for Fox and star Spencer Tracy when it was first released, Me and My Gal now seems like a definitive urban comedy of the Great Depression. 80 min. Fri, Mar 8, 7:30; Sat, Mar 23, 4:00

Riley the Cop. 1928. Directed by John Ford. Hollywood's go-to Irishman for 297 films, J. Farrell MacDonald, was granted a rare leading performance in this utterly charming late silent comedy. Silent. 67 min.

Lightnin'. 1925. Directed by John Ford. The stage comedy broke Broadway records when it premiered in 1918, and although it is forgotten today, the film adaptation was clearly a plum assignment for young director John Ford. Silent. 104 min. Sat, Mar 9, 3:30; Mon, Mar 11, 4:00

The Black Watch, 1929, Directed by John Ford. In Ford's first talking feature, a British Army captain is sent to India to neutralize an uprising led by a charismatic, scantily clad princess (Myrna Loy, still in her

"exotic" period). 93 min.

Lazybones. 1925. Directed by Frank Borzage. Buck Jones plays a happy-go-lucky small-town loafer who adopts a foundling, but when the child grows into a teenager (Madge Bellamy), Lazybones finds his feelings for her complicated by a new emotion. Silent. 79 min. Sun, Mar 10, 3:00; Sun, Mar 24, 4:30

Surrender. 1931. Directed by William K. Howard. In a Prussian castle converted into a prisonerof-war camp, Warner Baxter and Ralph Bellamy compete for the attentions of the daughter of the castle. 70 min. Tue, Mar 12, 6:30; Sat, Mar 16, 6:30

Body and Soul. 1931. Directed by Alfred Santell. Charles Farrell stars as a WWI flyer who has an affair with Elissa Landi, believing her to be the disreputable mistress of a colleague killed in combat, when she is in fact his widow. 83 min. Tue, Mar 19, 4:30; Mon, Mar 25, 4:00

The Warrior's Husband. 1933. Directed by Walter Lang. Elissa Landi muscled up to play the no-nonsense commander of the Amazon army, who is forced by her queen to marry a mincing example of detoxified masculinity, played by Ernest Truex. 75 min. Fri, Mar 15, 4:30; Tue, Mar 19, 7:00

The Man Who Came Back. 1931. Directed by Raoul Walsh. In this most unusual entry in the Janet Gaynor-Charles Farrell cycle, a Park Avenue wastrel's industrialist father prevents his marriage to a humble cabaret singer. That's only the beginning of the pair's misfortunes. 74 min. Wed, Mar 20, 7:00; Sat, Mar 23, 2:00

Pilgrimage. 1933. Directed by John Ford. Henrietta Crosman offers a devastating performance as a hardened farm woman who prevents the marriage of her son to a neighbor girl, only to have him enlist in the army and become a casualty of the Great War. 96 min. Sun, Mar 17, 1:30; Tue, Mar 26, 4:30

Transatlantic. 1931. Directed by William K. Howard. Multiple stories intersect aboard an ocean liner in this major rediscovery, featuring deep-focus camera work by James Wong Howe. 78 min. Fri, Mar 22, 4:30;

Lauren Bacall's defining characteristics onscreen—strong, independent, smart, opinionated—mirrored her accomplishments as an actor, political activist, and author. To Have and Have Not. 1944. Directed by Howard Hawks. Desperate for cash, an American charter captain on the island of Martinique reluctantly agrees to transport a resistance fighter on the run from the Nazis. 100 min. Fri. Mar 1. 1:30

Woman's World. 1954. Directed by Jean Negulesco. Trusting in the old adage that behind every great man is an even greater woman, a tycoon looking for the perfect general manager for his automotive company evaluates a trio of very different couples. 94 min. Wed, Mar 6, 1:30

The Big Sleep. 1946. Directed by Howard Hawks. In this classic adaptation of Raymond Chandler's twisty noir, Philip Marlowe (Humphrey Bogart) is hired by a wealthy family to find out who is blackmailing their youngest daughter. 114 min. Thu, Mar 7, 1:30

Dark Passage. 1947. Written and directed by Delmer Daves. In the third of four films costarring Bogart and Bacall, a framed man has his face altered in order to reclaim his innocence. 106 min. Fri. Mar 8. 1:30

Key Largo. 1948. Directed by John Huston. In Key Largo to visit an army buddy's widow and her wheelchair-bound father, a veteran finds himself trapped in their hotel by a massive hurricane and a posse of gangsters. 100 min. Wed, Mar 13, 1:30

Young Man with a Horn. 1950. Directed by Michael Curtiz. Based on the tragic life of musician Bix Beiderbecke, Young Man with a Horn features jazz greats like Hoagy Carmichael, Willie "Smoke" Willoughby, and Juano Hernandez. 112 min.

Manderlay. 2005. Denmark. Written and directed by Lars Von Trier. In 1933, on a plantation in Alabama, slavery is still in place, administered by Mam (Bacall). When a young woman insists on telling the inhabitants that slavery was abolished in 1865, her father tells her to mind her own business, 135 min.

How to Marry a Millionaire.

1953. Directed by Jean Negulesco, A trio of Manhattan models and self-described gold diggers are out to land some big fish, and they can't afford to be sidetracked by actually falling in love. 95 min. Wed, Mar 20, 1:30

The Cobweb. 1955. Directed by Vincente Minnelli. When the head doctor at a psychiatric clinic suggests that the patients design and make new drapes for the common room, the project highlights the myriad psychoses and traumas of patients, staff, and families alike, 125 min. Wed. Mar 21.1:30

Birth. 2004. Directed by Jonthan Glazer. A little boy, born at the exact moment of a man's death, slips into a fancy apartment during a party and tells the man's widow that he has returned. Her skepticism is soon followed by harrowing belief. 100 min.

Written on the Wind. 1956. Directed by Douglas Sirk. Sirk is at his most Sirkian in this melodrama about two friends,

Designing Woman, 1957. Directed by Vincente Minnelli. Chic, sophisticated fashion designer Marilla and down-toearth sportswriter Mike fall in love but no one, including them, can understand why. 118 min.
