Camera Obtrusa: The Action Documentaries of Kazuo Hara

As evidenced by this career-spanning retrospective—which opens with an onstage talk with Kazuo Hara and his wife and producer Sachiko Kobayashi, moderated by Michael Moore—Hara's impact both on nonfiction cinema and on postwar Japanese society is far more profound than his relatively sparse body of work would suggest. All films are from Japan and directed by Kazuo Hara.

Yukiyukite Shingun (The Emperor's Naked Army Marches On). 1987. Hara's notorious film takes as its unhinged subject a veteran of the Imperial Japanese Army who uses Hara's camera to force his former superior officers into confessing to atrocities committed on their own soldiers in New Guinea in 1945, three weeks after Japan's surrender. 122 min. 
Sayounara CP (Goodbye CP). 1972. "Those of you with cerebral palsy. Throw away your wheelchairs, and crawl forth on your knees!" Activists Yokota and Yoshiko speak and act frankly about their CP. 82 min.

Kyokushiteki Erosu Koiuta 1974 (Extreme Private Eros: Love Song 1974). 1974. Surely the most bizarre and brutally candid love triangle ever recorded on film, this is also the portrait of a defiant, righteous, and troubled feminist—the filmmaker's ex-wife Miyuki Takeda. 98 min.

Zennshin Shousetsuka (A Dedicated Life). 1994. The top film in Kinema Junpo's prestigious Ten Best Films of 1994, Hara's intensely intimate documentary follows radical leftist author Mitsuhari Inuoe as he undergoes painful cancer treatments, revealing the cult-like loyalty he engenders among his acolytes and lovers. 157 min. Matanohi No Chika (The Many Faces of Chika). 2005. This daring experimental drama, with its echoes of Haruki Murakami's Norwegian Wood, charts the anarchical politics and violent social upheaval of 1970s Japan through a woman's relationships with various men. 114 min.

Methadone: An American Way of Dealing. 1974. Directed by Julia Reichert, Jim Klein. This documentary about the rise in heroin addiction in the early 1970s captures how social services, designed to help, in fact often neutralize those they intend to serve, as professionals treat social problems as mental illness or personal weakness. 60 min. Growing Up Female. 1971. Directed by Julia Reichert, Jim Klein, A personal look into the lives of six women, ages four to 35, and the forces that shape them: teachers, counselors, advertising, music, and the institution of marriage. 52 min. Seeing Red: Stories of American Communists. 1983. Directed by Julia Reichert, Jim Klein. Seeing Red recounts the forgotten history and adventures of ordinary Americans who joined the Communist Party, and the high price many of them paid during the Red Scare in the 1950s. 100 min. A Lion in the House. 2006. Directed by Julia Reichert, Steven Bognar. This TV documentary puts viewers in the shoes of parents, physicians, nurses, siblings, grandparents, and social workers as five children and their families battle pediatric cancer at Cincinnati Children's Hospital. 225 min. Cinéma 16 - Photo-souvenir. 1978. France. Directed by Edmond Séchan. Resembling a terrific episode of *Black Mirror*, this film in the popular French television series *Cinéma 16* stars Jean-Claude Carrière as a surgeon who becomes obsessed with decrypting a series of mysterious Polaroid snapshots. 80 min. Alain Delon and Romy Schneider star as a bourgeois couple who go dramatically astray when her ex-lover and his sensuous teenage daughter pay them a visit. 120 min. Max, mon amour (Max My Love). 1986. France/USA/Japan. Directed by Nagisa Oshima. A diplomat and his wife attempt to assimilate her chimpanzee lover into civilized society. 92 min. Sat, Jun 1, 7:30

La tragédie de Carmen (The Tragedy of Carmen). 1983. France/Great Britain/West Germany/USA. Directed by Peter Brook. The rarely screened film version of Brook, Jean-Claude Carrière, and composer Marius Constant's radically reinvented and foreshortened version of Bizet's Carmen. 85 min.

C'était la guerre (It Was War). 1993. France/Algeria. Directed by Maurice Failevic, Ahmed Rachedi. An examination of the Algerian War of Independence, based upon a pair of novelistic memoirs. 180 min. Sun, Jun 2, 4:00

La controverse de Valladolid (Dispute in Valladolid). 1992. France. Directed by Jean-Daniel Verhaeghe. A dramatization of the Valladolid debate of 1550 following Spain's conquest of the



New World, in which King Charles gathered Catholic theologians and scholars to argue over whether a just war could be waged against Native Americans. 90 min. Wed. Jun 5. 7:30: Sat, Jun 8, 1:30

Les étonnements d'un couple moderne (The Discoveries of a Modern Couple). 1986. France. Directed by Pierre Boutron. A bourgeois couple are convinced their best friends are aliens and the Earth's days are numbered. 91 min. Thu, Jun 6, 1:00

L'Alliance (The Wedding Ring). 1970. France. Directed by Christian de Chalonge. A veterinary surgeon and a mysterious woman enter into an arranged marriage and find themselves pitted against each other and against the menagerie of animals and insects he brings into their bourgeois home. 90 min. Fri, Jun 7, 1:30; Sat, Jun 15, 4:30

Credo. 1983. France. Directed by Jacques Deray, Jean-Claude Carrière and policier specialist Deray's intense drama is based on an actual Cold War incident in which a Ukrainian prisoner of conscience was forced to defend his Christian faith while under Soviet interrogation. 90 min. Sun, Jun 9, 1:30; Thu, Jun 13, 4:00

Bouvard et Pécuchet (Bouvard and Pecuchet). 1989. France. Directed by Jean-Daniel Verhaeghe. A witty French

adaptation of Gustave Flaubert's unfinished satirical novel of 19th-century dilettantism. 170 min. Sun, Jun 9, 4:00

Un homme est mort (The Outside Man). 1972. Italy/ France/USA. Directed by Jacques Deray, Jean-Louis Trintignant stars as a French contract killer who heads to Los Angeles to bump off a mobster, only to have a Detroit hit man (Roy Scheider) stalk him throughout the unnervingly foreign city. 104 min. Thu, Jun 13, 1:30; Sun, Jun 16, 1:30

Birth. 2004. USA. Directed by Jonathan Glazer. Nicole Kidman is in thrall to a young boy who claims to be her dead husband in this exquisitely crafted gothic tale. 100 min. Fri, Jun 14, 7:30; Sat. Jun 15, 1:30

L'Amant d'un jour (Lover for a Day). 2017. France. Directed by Philippe Garrel. In this original story by four screenwriters (two men and two women), a 23-year-old woman moves in with her adoring father, a philosophy professor, and the 23-year-old student he has (of course) taken as a lover. 76 min. Fri, Jun 14, 4:00; Sat, Jun 15, 7:00
