HENRI CARTIER-BRESSON The Modern Century

Henri Cartier-Bresson (1908-2004) is one of the most influential and beloved figures in the history of photography. Released to accompany an exhibition at The Museum of Modern Art, Henri Cartier-Bresson: The Modern Century is the first major publication to make full use of the extensive holdings of the Fondation Henri Cartier-Bresson in Paris—including thousands of prints and a vast resource of documents relating to the photographer's life and work. The heart of the book surveys Cartier-Bresson's career through three hundred photographs divided into twelve chapters. While many of his most famous pictures are included, a great number of images will be unfamiliar even to specialists. A wide-ranging essay by Peter Galassi, Chief Curator of Photography at the Museum, offers an entirely new understanding of Cartier-Bresson's extraordinary career and its overlapping contexts of journalism and art. The extensive supporting material—featuring detailed chronologies of the photographer's professional travels and his picture stories as they appeared in magazines—will revolutionize the study of Cartier-Bresson's work.

MARINA ABRAMOVIĆ The Artist Is Present

Since the beginning of her career, in Belgrade in the late 1960s, Marina Abramović has been a pioneer of performance art, and she has created some of the most important works in the field. Marina Abramović: The Artist Is Present accompanies an exhibition at The Museum of Modern Art that documents approximately fifty of the artist's ephemeral time- and media-based works from throughout her career, including re-creations by other performers and a new work created for the occasion and performed by the artist herself. The volume spans more than four decades of Abramović's interventions, sound pieces, video works, installations, photographs, and solo performances as well as her collaborative performances with the German artist Ulay (Uwe Laysiepen), and includes, on an accompanying CD, an audio commentary by Abramović that guides the reader through the book. Essays by the curator and four distinguished scholars examine Abramović's concepts of time, duration, performance, and re-performance.

WILLIAM KENTRIDGE: TRACE Prints from The Museum of Modern Art

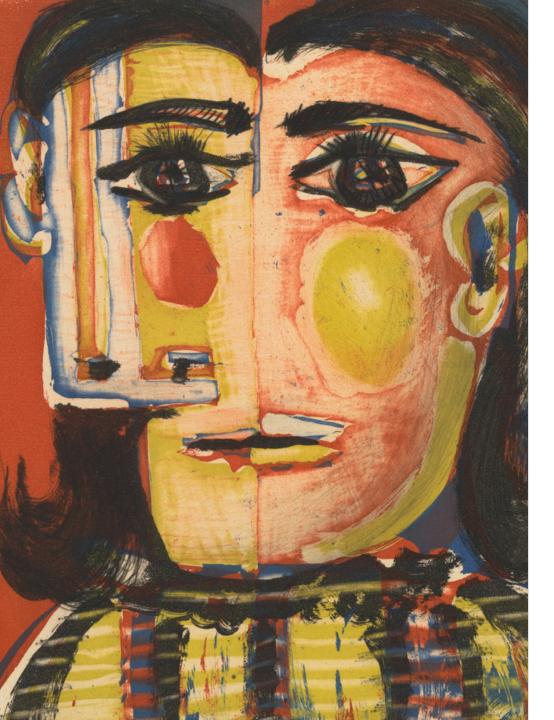
William Kentridge is well known for a practice that brings together drawing, film animation, sculpture, and performing arts; too little known is the extent to which the South African artist applies his astonishing draftsmanship to the techniques of printmaking, including etching, screenprinting, lithography, and linoleum cut. At once a catalogue and an artist's book, this visually compelling publication highlights the Museum's unparalleled collection of prints and books by Kentridge—nearly fifty works made over the past three decades—and features a succession of artistic interventions created by him for the occasion. Published to coincide with the Museum's presentation of William Kentridge: Five Themes, a touring exhibition, the volume includes an essay by Judith B. Hecker, Assistant Curator of Prints and Illustrated Books at MoMA, a beautifully illustrated plate section, an annotated checklist, a chronology, and a text by the artist on printmaking that together illuminate the medium's relevance to his broader practice.

A PICASSO PORTFOLIO Prints from The Museum of Modern Art

Over his long career Pablo Picasso made well over two thousand etchings, engravings, drypoints, aquatints, lithographs, and linoleum cuts. A Picasso Portfolio: Prints from The Museum of Modern Art, published to accompany an exhibition at the Museum, explores Picasso's creative process in printmaking starting in the early twentieth century with his Blue and Rose periods and extending up to the last years of his life, as his work continually expanded practice in the medium. Divided into twelve thematic sections, the book presents highlights from the Museum's extraordinary collection of Picasso's prints. These include such celebrated 1930s masterworks as Minotauromachy and The Weeping Woman as well as artist's proofs from throughout his career that reveal how Picasso's imagery developed. The volume is filled with full-page illustrations accompanied by extended captions and features an essay by Deborah Wye, Chief Curator of Prints and Illustrated Books at MoMA, as well as a chronology and bibliography focusing on Picasso's printmaking.

WOMEN ARTISTS AT THE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART

Women Artists at The Museum of Modern Art represents the first effort by a major North American museum to examine its collection in light of the feminist scholarship of the past three decades. Featuring illustrated essays by nearly fifty writers, including MoMA curators and many other voices in current research on art and gender, this groundbreaking publication presents a range of generational and cultural perspectives, focusing on a diverse group of artists active from the late nineteenth century to the present whose works span the spectrum of mediums and genres in the Museum's collection. Organized chronologically into three sections—Early Modernism, Midcentury, and Contemporary—the book emphasizes new research on women artists within these historical periods, foregrounding a conversation between past considerations of MoMA's collection and current feminist narratives of art history and putting these varied modes of exploration in productive dialogue.

CONTEMPORARY CHINESE ART Primary Documents

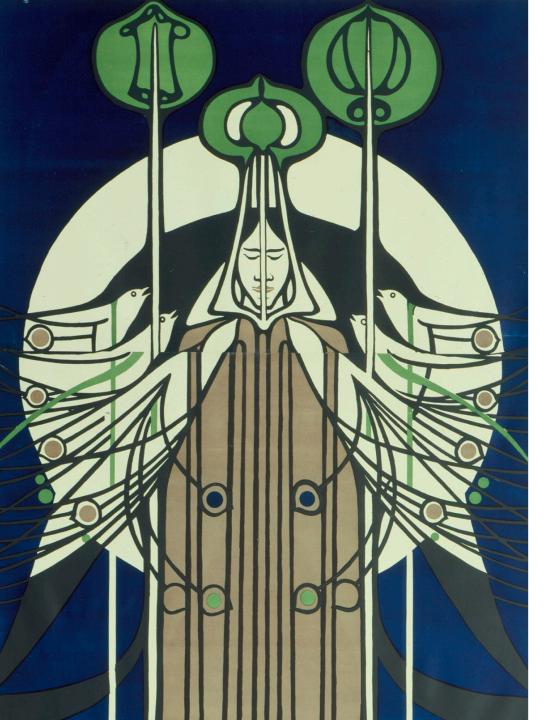

Over the last three decades. China has become home to one of the liveliest and most creative art scenes in the world, but firsthand accounts of this fervent period have rarely been published in Western languages. Contemporary Chinese Art: Primary Documents presents a collection of writings that includes Chinese artists' manifestos, exhibition catalogue texts, seminal essays by critics, and interviews with key artists, many of them available in English for the first time. Arranged in chronological order and contextualized in an introduction by Wu Hung, The Harrie A. Vanderstappen Distinguished Service Professor of Art History, East Asian Languages and Civilizations at the University of Chicago, these texts guide readers through the evolution of Chinese art from the late 1970s to the present. Sourcebook and anthology, this publication is an essential resource for scholars in the field and an introduction to contemporary Chinese artists and their work. Contemporary Chinese Art is the fifth publication in an ongoing series by the International Program of The Museum of Modern Art that makes crucial art-historical writings from regions outside the United States available in English.

BRITISH DESIGN

As the birthplace of the Industrial Revolution, Great Britain was the epicenter of the development of modern industrial design. This book—the fourth volume in the MoMA Design Series, featuring works in the Museum's extraordinary collection—explores this legacy, tracing the growth of British design from the eighteenth century to the Millennium Dome and beyond. In its more than twohundred-year scope, British Design explores Wedgwood pottery, the Arts and Crafts Movement, the Mini car and Dyson vacuum cleaner, the "Cool Britannia" cultural explosion in the late 1990s, and British designers' take on the digital devices that define entertainment and communication in the early twenty-first century. An introduction by Paola Antonelli. Senior Curator of Architecture and Design at The Museum of Modern Art, provides an overview of design culture in Great Britain; an essay and timeline by Hugh Aldersey-Williams, author of The Most Beautiful Molecule and New American, illuminate the masterpieces of modern British design superbly reproduced in the volume's plate section.

CARIBBEAN MODERNIST ARCHITECTURE Archivos de Arquitectura Antillana/AAA 034

In February and March 2008 the International Program and the Department of Architecture and Design at The Museum of Modern Art organized the Museum's first symposium on the modernist architecture of the Caribbean and bordering Latin American countries, in collaboration with the Caribbean School of Architecture at the University of Technology, Kingston, Jamaica. The goal was to encourage scholarly, curatorial, and broader educational awareness. Topics included regional and international legacies, preservation, environmental sustainability. and urban planning as they relate to modernist architectural history and contemporary practice. The presenters were leading architects and architectural historians from the region, and attendees included their colleagues as well as students, policy makers, civic leaders, and developers from Jamaica, the surrounding Caribbean islands, and the United States. This illustrated volume, copublished by MoMA and Archivos de Arquitectura Antillana, an architectural journal based in the Dominican Republic, presents the papers from this critical symposium in both English and Spanish, making them accessible for the first time to a broader public.

MEET ME Making Art Accessible to People with Dementia

The Museum of Modern Art is one of the first museums in the country to make its collection and exhibitions specially accessible to people with Alzheimer's disease. In 2006 the Museum launched Meet Me at MoMA, a groundbreaking educational program featuring interactive gallery tours for individuals with the disease and their family members and caregivers. Meet Me: Making Art Accessible to People with Dementia brings the Meet Me at MoMA experience beautifully to life through pictures and dialogue from programs in the Museum. The publication includes testimonials by those living with Alzheimer's disease, conversations with experts in the field of aging, dementia. and art, and findings from a research study about the program's efficacy. Guide sections enable museum staff and family and professional caregivers to effectively implement similar successful educational experiences in their own settings. Illustrated lesson plans using works from MoMA's collection (with an accompanying DVD of image reproductions) compose the second volume in this twovolume set

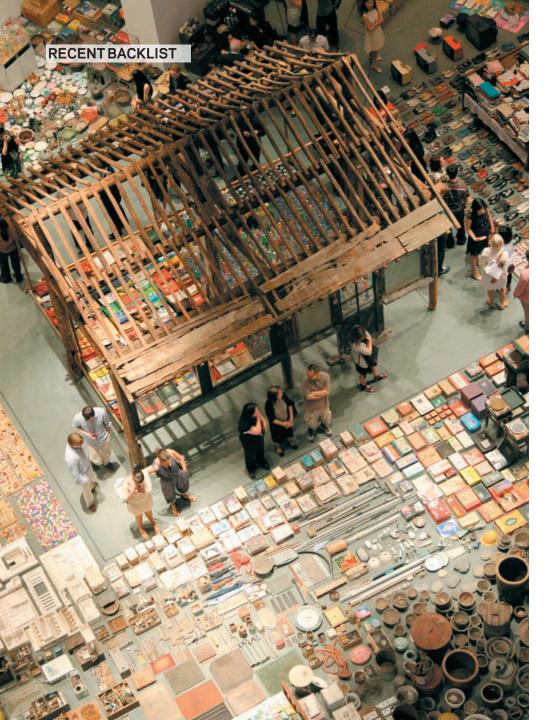

GABRIEL OROZCO

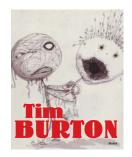

Since the early 1990s Gabriel Orozco has forged a career marked by surprise and innovation, working freely and fluently among drawing, photography, sculpture, installation, and painting to create a heterogeneous body of objects that resists categorization. This volume, designed in collaboration with Orozco to accompany an exhibition of his work at The Museum of Modern Art, offers a comprehensive examination of the artist's career from the late 1980s to the present. Critical essays provide new approaches to grounding Orozco's work in the larger landscape of contemporary art, complemented by a richly illustrated chronology that combines biographical information with focused discussions of selected objects and introduces the artist's own reflections on his work.

The Bauhaus school of art and design brought together artists, architects, and designers in an extraordinary conversation about the nature of art in the industrial age. Bauhaus 1919-1933: Workshops for Modernity, published to accompany a major multimedia exhibition at The Museum of Modern Art, is MoMA's first comprehensive treatment of the subject since its famous Bauhaus exhibition of 1938. It offers a new generational perspective on the twentieth century's most influential experiment in artistic education. In addition to approximately four hundred full-color plates that examine the extraordinarily broad spectrum of the school's products, Bauhaus 1919–1933 includes two overarching essays by the exhibition's curators, shorter essays by over twenty leading scholars, and an illustrated narrative chronology.

Tim Burton has reinvented Hollywood genre filmmaking over the past three decades in a distinctive visual style inspired by the aesthetics of animation and silent comedy. Published to accompany a major retrospective of Burton's work at The Museum of Modern Art, this book narrates the evolution of the artist's creative practice, following the current of his visual imagination from his childhood drawings through to his mature oeuvre. Lavishly illustrating works on paper, film stills, puppets and maquettes, storyboards, and graphic work—including previously unseen material from his personal archive—this volume sheds new light on Burton as an artist and filmmaker.

CLAUDE MONET: Water Lilies

In 1955 The Museum of Modern Art became the first public collection in the United States to acquire one of Claude Monet's large-scale paintings of the Japanese-style pond and gardens of his house in Giverny, France. Today works from the same series—a mural-sized triptych and a single canvas—are among the most beloved paintings in the Museum's collection. This lively volume recounts the history of Monet's Water Lilies at the Museum—including the destruction of two works in a fire in 1958—and underscores the paintings' resonance with the art and artists of the last half-century.

RON ARAD: No Discipline

In the heated contemporary debate about the difference between design and art, Ron Arad stands apart. Since the beginning of his career, in the early 1980s, he has moved freely among milieus, designing the lobby of an opera house, a chair assembled from cast-off car seats, a limited-edition chaise longue for collectors, and an industrially produced lamp for domestic consumers, among many other projects. The creative freedom he espouses moves across boundaries and arouses both enmity and admiration. Ron Arad: No Discipline examines Arad's work through essays, an interview with the artist, and renderings of over 150 objects and spaces, demonstrating the breadth of his practice.

IN & OUT OF AMSTERDAM: Travels in Conceptual Art, 1960-1976

During the 1960s and 1970s, Amsterdam attracted artists from all over the world, and, reciprocally, some of the most influential Dutch artists traveled abroad extensively before establishing themselves in the city. A dynamic cross-pollination of ideas and influences developed there, and many artists produced works directly related to the notion of travel and to Amsterdam. Essays by an array of scholars, accompanied by illustrations and documentary photographs, illuminate the significance of these works as well as the unprecedented role played by prints, bulletins, posters, mail art, artists' books, and other ephemera. A brief essay or interview introduces each artist; an extensive chronology, bibliography, and illustrated checklist round out this unique volume.

JAMES ENSOR

James Ensor was a major figure in the Belgian avant-garde in the late nineteenth century and an important precursor to Expressionism. This remarkable book—published to accompany an exhibition at The Museum of Modern Art—is the most comprehensive volume on Ensor in English. Approximately one hundred paintings, prints, and drawings are featured, creating a network of themes and images to produce a complete picture of the artist's daring, experimental oeuvre. Ensor's modernity, his innovative and allegorical use of light, his prominent use of satire, his deep interest in carnival and performance, and, finally, his own self-fashioning, masking, and role playing are examined in essays by an array of international scholars.

León Ferrari and Mira Schendel are among the most significant Latin American artists of the twentieth century. León Ferrari and Mira Schendel: Tangled Alphabets was published by The Museum of Modern Art to accompany the first comprehensive exhibition of the work of these two artists in the United States. This essential catalogue presents new insights into the artists' groundbreaking work, examining the connections and collisions between the visual arts, writing, politics, and religion in their oeuvres.

Art critic, cultural historian, and photographer Alfredo Boulton (1908–1995) was one of Venezuela's foremost cultural observers of the twentieth century and a highly influential figure in the development of modernist art and discourse in his country and the surrounding region. His diverse contributions serve as points of departure in this unique anthology of manifestos, correspondence, and critical writings by notable Latin American intellectuals of Boulton's time. New critical and explanatory essays by contemporary scholars provide frames of reference for understanding the political, demographic, and cultural contexts of the historical texts.
