Family Activity Guide

Picasso Guitars 1912-1914

Work as a family! Use the questions, activities, and close-looking exercises in this guide.





Spanish artist Pablo Picasso made many artworks about a single subject: the guitar. In this guide we'll explore four of them, each made with different materials.

LOCATE the exhibition *Picasso: Guitars 1912–1914*, on the third floor of the Museum.

FIND Picasso's cardboard guitar (above left) on the gallery wall. Its title is Still life with *Guitar*

COMPARE the sculpture with a real guitar (above).

DRAW lines matching parts in Picasso's sculpture with those in the real guitar. How are these guitars similar? How are they different? Does Picasso's guitar have some parts not found on the real instrument?

FIND Guitar, a collage by Picasso from 1913.

Picasso made collages using different kinds of paper and materials. He cut the paper into different shapes, arranged them, and then glued them down.

Charcoal lines (black)

What do you think? How is it like a painting? How is it like a sculpture?


How is Picasso's metal guitar different from his cardboard guitar?

Some people think Picasso cut the sound hole for the sheet metal guitar from an ordinary metal pipe that he found or bought from a hardware store.

LOOK for **Guitar**, a charcoal drawing Picasso made in 1912.



In this drawing Picasso mixed up the front, sides, and back of the guitar, showing all of them at once!
