## MUSEUM OF MODERN ART OPENS SMALL EXHIBITION OF MODERN TEXTILES LATER TO BE SHOWN THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

Because of the increasingly important role contemporary fabrics play in the simple modern interiors of today, the small Exhibition of Modern Textiles opening at the Museum of Modern Art, ll West 53 Street, on Wednesday, August 29, is of special interest. The exhibition, which consists of hand-woven, hand-printed and machine-woven and machine-printed fabrics, is in effect a concise survey of modern textile design.

The exhibition, prepared especially for the Museum's Circulating Exhibitions program, has been assembled and installed by Susanne Wasson-Tucker of the Department of Industrial Design. It is composed of twenty-five panels showing yard samples of actual fabrics and smaller square samples mounted on standard-sized wooden frames, suitable for shipment as a travelling exhibition subsequent to its showing in the Museum's auditorium galleries.

Some of the fabrics shown are designers' samples; others are cut from commercially available lengths. All of them have been chosen to emphasize the value of well-designed textiles in the modern interior. Since present-day interiors are simpler than those of previous eras, the qualities of color, texture and pattern have become more important in determining their use. Therefore the exhibition stresses the vital role of the craftsman in doing research, and in experimenting and supplying creative ideas which can be adapted to mass-production.

The exhibition includes examples by leading professional designers as well as by students of Black Mountain College, Cranbrook Academy of Art, the Chicago Institute of Design and the University of California. Among well-known textile designers represented are Anni Albers, Louise Bourgeois, Dan Cooper, Marli Ehrman, Donelda Fazakas, Pamela Hume, Dorothy Liebes, Marianne Strengell and Robert D. Sailors.

After the exhibition closes on September 23, it will be sent on tour to colleges, universities and art museums in various parts of the country.
