INTERNATIONAL SCULPTURE COMPETITION PRIZES AWARDED

Three American sculptors were among the 12 prize-winners in the International Sculpture Competition conducted by the London Institute of Contemporary Arts for a monument to "The Unknown Political Prisoner."

Reg Butler, English sculptor, won the Grand Prize, which will be erected on a suitable sire with Competition funds. The Grand Prize also carries with it £4,525 for the sculptor. In addition to the erection of this prize-winning sculpture on a monumental scale, there are plans under way by individual countries to erect one of their own winning sculptures as a monument. All winning entries will be on view at the Tate Gallery in London from March 13.

Four prizes of 1750 were awarded to the following:

Seven honorable mentions at £250 each were awarded as follows:

Additional biographical notes:

Res Butler: Born 1913, Hertfordshire. Qualified as architect. Has worked as blacksmith in Bussex village. Gregory Fellow in Sculpture, Leeds. University since 1950. Represented in Tate Gallery. Exhibited at Institute of Contemporary Arts, Battersea, 1950 & 1951. Biennale, venice, 1952.

Berbara Henworth: Born 1903, Wakefield, Yorkshire. Educated Wakefield Ulris High School. Won scholarship to Leeds School of Art. Studied for 3 years at Royal College of Art, London, and later in Italy. Exhibited widely, including Biennale, Venice, 1950.

Lynn Chadwick: Born 1914, Barnes, London. Trained as architect. Pilot, Flest Air Arm. First shown in London (Gimpel Pila). Also exhibited Paris, New York, and at the Bionnale, Venico, 1952. Represented in Tate Callery.

Max Bill: Born in 1908. Architect, painter, sculptor, industrial designer, typographer, designer of exhibitions. Studied at Kunstgeworbe Huseum in Eurich, at Pauhaus in Dessau. Has lectured in many countries. Author of many books.

Forgel Hinder: New York-born wife of Frank Hinder, en Australian painter. She works in wood and stone, teaches in Last Sydney, Australia.

Honri-Coornes Adam: Born Paris, 190h. Worked with Picasso. Has exhibited at Calerio Macght in Paris. Works in prints as well as soulpture. Soulpture owned by Russe de l'Art Moderne in Paris.

Antoing Pavaner: Born in Grel, Russia (older brother of Naum Gabo) in 1000. Studied in Kiev, Paris, Herway, reterning to Moscow with Gabo in 1917 to set up a workshop based on centemperary trends. To France 1923 where he exhibited, became a French citizen in 1930. [Arge retrespective exhibition with Gabo at Museum of Modern Art, 1948.

Mirko Resaldella (known as Mirko): Born 1910 in Udine, Italy. Commissioned, as result of open competition in Italy, by Italian Government to execute 3 bronze gates as esmorial for Italian reprisal killings by Germans in 1914. He has had several exhibitions in New York galleries, works as a goldswith end engraver as well as in sculpture. Lives in Nose.

Luciano Minguezi: Born in Bologna, 1911. Has won prizes at the Venice Biennales and Quadriennales. Has executed various important monuments in Italy and doors for the Milan Cathedral.
