THE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART NEW YORK

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Paintings and sculptures by five British artists have recently been acquired by the Museum of Modern Art, 11 West 55rd Street, New York, for its Collection and are now on view in a special exhibition. Two young artists - the 50-year-old sculptor Leslie T. Thornton and the 55-year-old painter Lucian Freud - are represented as well as Henry Moore, Graham Butherland and Walter Richard Sickert. The painting by Sickert, <u>Sir Thomas Beecham Conducting</u>, is probably the first major painting by this leading Eritish painter to enter an American museum. A painting by a young Australian, Sidney Nolan, now living in London, is also included in the group of New Acquisitions.

The sculpture by Moore was a gift of Time, Inc. and is a bronze study for his sculpture for the Time-Life Building in London. The Sutherland picture, <u>Thorn Beads</u>, is a painting of great conviction and power done in 1945. Two pictures by Lucián Freud were given by Lincoln Kirstein. They are <u>Portrait of a Moman</u> and <u>Dead Monkey</u>. The portrait is of a woman who lived next door to Freud and had been bombed out during the war and had much personal tragedy, Mr. Kirstein says. It was painted in 1949. Thornton's iron wire sculpture is called <u>Man Fishing from a Fior</u>, and is the first piece by this young artist to enter the Museum Collection.
