THE SUPERPRODUCTION, FILM SERIES AT MUSEUM OF MODERN ART

The Superproduction, a film series at the Museum of Modern Art, 11 West 53 Street, will begin January 18-24 with Cecil B. de Mille's Mele and Female. The 1919 film, with Gloria Swanson, Lila Lee, Thomas Meighan and Bebe Daniels, will be the first of 11 programs illustrating the Barnum tradition in the movies. On view for one week each, the series will continue with The Thief of Bagdad (1924), America (1924), Beau Geste (1926), King Kong (1933), The Lives of a Bengal Lancer (1935), Romeo and Juliet (1936), The Good Earth (1937), Marie Antoinette (1938), Wuthering Heights (1939) and How Green Was My Valley (1941).

"The descendent of vaudeville and the circus," says Richard Griffith, Curator of the Film Library, "the superproduction genre has given us a great many films which represent the medium at its best. The need for spectacle and excitement brings into play the film's capacity for sweeping movement, overwhelming action, pace and rhythm. It is true that the superproduction has lent itself to the immemorial vulgarities of Western civilization - false history, grandiloquence, and spurious taste in costume and design. But it has also given us the true nature of hand-to-hand combat in Griffith's <u>America</u>, the astounding science fiction of <u>King</u> <u>Kong</u>, the plague of locusts in the <u>Good Earth</u> along with that film's amazing performances, the derring-do of the <u>Thief of Bagdad</u>, <u>Beau Geste</u> and <u>The Lives of a Bangal</u> <u>Lancer</u>. A favorite whipping boy of critics, the superproduction yet contains. the exhuberant essence of movie."

<u>The Superproduction</u> is Part III of <u>The First Sixty Years</u>, a review of the entire range of film history during its growth as the most popular art of the Twentieth Century. Not since 1939, when a retrospective cycle of 300 films launched the auditorium programs, has the Film Library presented a chronological survey based on its collection. <u>The First Sixty Years</u> will continue during a twoyear period, interspersed between special film cycles.
