Nov. 17 -SPECIAL EXHIBITION AND ANNOUNCEMENT OF FUTURE PLANS.

Dec. 1 (Note: NOT FOR RELEASE UNTIL NOVEMBER 17.) Models of new wing of Museum of Modern Art and other visual material in special show "Toward the New Museum of Modern Art." Accompanied by spacious installation on ground floor of a few recently acquired works of art.

Nov. 17 -Re-installation of Collection on second floor to include selections throughout from architecture and design collection, photography collection, the year print collection in addition to paintings.

Nov. 17 -Christmas Print Sale for Museum members. Annual exhibition and sale Dec. 20 of prints in Members' Penthouse. The selection will include examples by well-known American and European printmakers. All prints are framed; maximum price \$150, with the majority priced under \$100. STRUCTURES BY RICHARD BUCKMINSTER FULLER. Revolutionary principles of Throughout the building are demonstrated in three unusual structures designed by Buckminster Fuller: a space frame "Octet Truss" of aluminum anodized winter gold, a green plastic dome, and a black and white aluminum and morel mast. The first examples of Mr. Fuller's work to be erected in New York. The mast was built by Shoji Sadao and Edison Price, Inc. The space frame "Octet Truss" was contributed by Aluminium Limited. The radome was lent by Lincoln Laboratories. The exhibition is under the direction of Arthur Drexles, Director of the Museum's Department of Architecture and Design. Opened Sept. 22. Museum Garden
