RODIN. More than 100 sculptures (bronze, marble, terra cotta, plaster)
and about 45 drawings and watercolors covering the period from 1863 to
1917. Important loans from the Philadelphia Rodin Museum, the California
Palace of the Legion of Honor and Musee Rodin, Paris, as well as private
and other public collections here and abroad. Directed by Peter Selz,
Curator, Painting and Sculpture Exhibitions. Accompanied by publication
by Albert Elsen with preface by Jacques Lipchitz and essay by Selz.

May 22 -AMERICANS 1963. Fifteen painters and sculptors represented by over a Aug. 18 hundred of their works will be included in the next of the series of American group exhibitions organized periodically at the Museum by Dorothy C. Miller, Curator of the Museum Collections. Previous exhibitions Press in the series were SIXTEEN AMERICANS (1959-60), TWELVE AMERICANS (1956), Preview May 21, FIFTEEN AMERICANS (1952) and others. Each artist will show a number of 11 am works in a gallery of his own, a plan which provides a series of small (First floor) 4 pm one-man shows within the framework of a large exhibition

May 28\* - FIVE UNRELATED PHOTOGRAPHERS: HEYMAN, KRAUSE, LIEBLING, WHITE, AND
July 21 WINOGRAND. A group of small one-man shows, about 25 works in each.
Photographers are American. Selected by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography, "to emphasize the independence and individuality of each man's work." Subjects include man in urban environment in U.S. and
Latin America; cémetery markers; Indian reservations in Montana; workers in a slaughterhouse; cafe society at El Morocco; pedestrians on Fifth
Avenue. (Auditorium gallery)

- July 30 DRAWINGS ACQUISITIONS. Directed by William Lieberman, Curator, Drawings Sept. 29 Prints. (Auditorium gallery)
- Sept. 11 HANS HOFMANN. A selected group of 40-50 major canvases by a world-renowned master recognized both as a painter and as the most influential and dynamic art teacher of his period. Most of the work will date from 1945. Selected by William C. Seitz, Associate Curator, Painting and Sculpture Exhibitions. Will later travel in this country and abroad under the auspices of the International Council of the Museum. Seitz will write accompanying catalog. (Third floor)
- Sept. 24 THE PHOTOGRAPHER IN THE AMERICAN LANDSCAPE. Will trace the changing concept of the landscape as a photographic genre in our country where explorations of a new continent coincided with explorations in a new medium. Work of about 15 photographers, ranging in date from the 1870s to the present will be included. Selected by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography. (First floor)
- Oct. 1 MEDARDO ROSSO. The first museum exhibition in the United States of the work of the revolutionary Italian sculptor, Medardo Rosso (1858-1928), the principal exponent of Impressionism in sculpture. Approximately 30 sculptures in wax and bronze and a few drawings will be selected by Peter Selz, Curator, Painting and Sculpture Exhibitions. The first definitive study of the artist will be written by Margaret Scholari Barr and will be published by the Museum on the occasion of the exhibition's opening.
