## New Exhibitions:

# RAUSCHENBERG: ILLUSTRATIONS FOR DANTE'S INFERNO

This exhibition of the 34 "combine drawings" by Robert Rauschenberg, illustrating each of the cantos in Dante's Inferno, began its European tour in February at the Whitechapel Art Gallery in London as part of a large exhibition of Rauschenberg's work. Through the initiative of the U.S.I.S. the drawings, which are from the Collection of The Museum of Modern Art, were then shown at the U.S. Embassy Gallery in London. The U.S.I.S., with the assistance of the Arts Council of Great Britain has also arranged showings in England at the University of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, the Ashmolean Museum at Oxford, and at the Arts Council Gallery at Cambridge.

## Special Project:

ART IN EMBASSIES - Bonn, Germany; Rome, Italy; Mexico City, Mexico

About 20 works will be shipped in May to Ambassador and Mrs. George C. McGhee in Bonn, Germany. The selection, which is the second prepared for Bonn, includes paintings by Josef Albers, Milton Avery, James Brooks, Nell Blaine, Grace Hartigan, Marsden Hartley, Hans Hofmann, Jan Müller, Bradley Walker Tomlin, Esteban Vicente; watercolors by Lyonel Feininger and Maurice Prendergast; sculpture by Gaston Lachaise, Ibram Lassaw, Reuben Nakian; and a lithograph by Ben Shahn.

Eleven paintings were sent in December to Ambassador and Mrs. Frederick Reinhardt in Rome, Italy. Landscapes and still lives from the late nineteenth and early twentieth centures, they were selected by the Ambassador from the collection of the California Palace of the Legion of Honor in San Francisco.

Ambassador Fulton Freeman, who has been transferred from Colombia to Mexico, has requested that the works on loan to him be sent to his new post, and owners of the works in the collection have agreed to an extension through December. Before being sent to Mexico, the collection will have a public showing in Bogota to inaugurate the new Bi-national Center. In Mexico City, the collection will be displayed in the new U.S. Chancery before transfer to the Embassy Residence.
