Oct. 1-ROBERT MOTHERWELL. A major retrospective of 87 paintings and collages Nov. 28 ranging from the '40s to the present by a leading abstract expressionist artist. Includes large recent paintings never before exhibited in New York. Selected by Frank O'Hara, Associate Curator, Painting & Sculpture Exhibitions. Will tour Europe under the auspices of the International Council of The Museum of Modern Art after the New York showing. floor, galleries 3 & 4.

Oct. 5-STRUCTURES FOR SOUND - MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS BY FRANCOIS & BERNARD BASCHET. Dec. 5 The exhibition, directed by Ludwig Glaeser, Associate Curator of the Museum's Department of Architecture & Design, features 12 instruments developed during the last 12 years by the French sculptor, François Baschet, and his brother, Bernard, a professional sound engineer. In addition to viewing the actual instruments, the public will be able to listen to the music which has been especially composed for the new sounds created by these instruments on six record players, equipped with individual earphones, which will be available in the exhibition galleries. 1st floor, galleries 5 & 6.

Oct. 6-RECENT ACQUISITIONS: PHOTOGRAPHY. An exhibition of approximately 40 representative works chosen from almost 2,000 prints acquired by the Museum's Photography Department in the past five years. The show will contain the work of about 35 photographers. Although a few date from the 1890's, the majority were taken by young photographers within the last few years.
