Sophia Loren was the guest of honor at a dinner given by the Trustees and the Film Department of The Museum of Modern Art on Wednesday, May 25.

Miss Loren and her husband arrived at the Museum at 6:30 p.m. for a special preview of the exhibition SOPHIA LOREN: THE CAREER OF AN ACTRESS, on view in the Museum's Auditorium Gallery throughout the summer. They were met by Mrs. Bliss Parkinson, President, René d'Harnoncourt, Director of the Museum, and Willard Van Dyke, Director of the Museum Film Department, who selected the show.

Guests were invited at 7:30 p.m. and asked to first visit the exhibition and then go to the Museum Garden where cocktails were served until 9 p.m. Miss Loren, her husband, Carlo Ponti, Mrs. Parkinson, Mr. d'Harnoncourt, and Mr. Van Dyke received the guests from 8 to 8:30 p.m., standing in front of a large weeping beech tree next to a sculpture by Rodin.

Guests included Museum Trustees, Philip Johnson, John de Menil, and Wallace K. Harrison; Robert O'Brien, President of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, and Mrs. O'Brien; Mrs. Douglas Auchincloss and Mrs. Alfred R. Stern, Co-Chairmen of the Museum's Junior Council; artists Robert Motherwell and his wife Helen Frankenthaler, whose paintings will be shown in the U.S. Pavilion at the Venice Biennale next month, Mark Rothko, Marisol, Robert Indiana, and Larry Rivers; television news commentators, Mike Wallace and Mrs. Wallace, Hugh Downs and Mrs. Downs, Ed Sullivan and Mrs. Sullivan, and Barry Gray and Mrs. Gray; Rudolph Joseph, Director of the Film Department of the Stadtmuseum in Munich, who first assembled the material and showed it in Germany and South America; actresses Piper Laurie and Phyllis Newman; and the famous photographer Captain Edward Steichen.

The dinner was held in the Museum's sixth floor Trustees' and Founders' Rooms on the top floor of the Museum's newest wing designed by Philip Johnson.

Following the dinner the guests attended a screening of <u>Yesterday</u>, Today and <u>Tomorrow</u>, a 1963 film in which Miss Loren starred.

The exhibition of stills and photographs which opened last week traces Miss Loren's career from 1950 to 1966.
