TOWARD A RATIONAL AUTOMOBILE. An exhibition of photographic panels, designer projects, models of future cars as well as student work, and some actual examples of cars illustrating the rational problem in car design; European and American efforts to design a functionally safe vehicle; and the irrational problem, the automobile as fantasy and wish fulfillment. Directed by Arthur Drexler, Director, Department of Architecture & Design; David Ash, Consultant. 1st floor, gallery 2.

An important group of six original plasters by Jacob Epstein, given by his widow, Lady Kathleen Epstein, and including portraits of Haile Selassie, Nehru and Rosalyn Tureck, shown together with Epstein's bronze of Paul Robeson and works by Dufy and Eilshemius given by Mrs. Carl Van Vechten. THE NEW JAPANESE PAINTING AND SCULPTURE. An exhibition of 60 paintings, Oct. 19-36 sculptures and 10 assemblages by 46 artists, one of the largest surveys Jan. 2 of recent Japanese avant-garde work ever to be shown outside Japan. Half the artists are 40 or younger, and the majority of work was executed in the 1960s. Selected by Dorothy C. Miller, Curator of Museum Collections, and William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings & Prints. The show is circulating in this country under the auspices of The International Council of The Museum of Modern Art. 1st floor, galleries 3 & 4.

CURRENT TEMPORARY EXHIBITIONS

Through Sept. 25 HENRI MATISSE: 64 PAINTINGS. 64 bils by one of the supreme 20th century masters showing the progression of his styles from 1899 to 1953, stressing the qualities of "ecstasy and tranquility" which he continuously sought. Included are major works from the Museum's 1951 retrospective as well as others not previously seen in New York. Directed by Monroe Wheeler, Director of Exhibitions & Publications; installed by Alicia Legg, Associate Curator, Department of Painting & Sculpture Exhibitions. An illustrated catalog with text by Lawrence Gowing accompanies the exhibition. A taperecorded Acoustiguide lecture-tour, written by A.L. Chanin, the Museum's docent, and narrated by Mr. Wheeler, is available for 50 cents at the entrance to the exhibition. 1st floor, galleries 3&4. (Opened July 19)

NAKIAN. A major retrospective of almost 150 works by a leading American abstract sculptor, including four important pieces on the theme of "The Judgment of Paris" which have never before been shown together. Also included are a number of small bronzes, terra cottas and drawings. Directed by Frank O'Hara, Associate Curator, Painting & Sculpture Exhibitions. 1st floor, gallery 2 & Sculpture Garden. Through Sept. 5** THE OBJECT TRANSFORMED. Utilitarian objects stripped of their usefulness through a transformation are rediscovered by the designer as a work of art. Knives, forks and spoons, pitchers, bottles, cups and saucers, chairs, clocks, books, a bed, an umbrella and a mirror are among the objects included. BRUCE DAVIDSON.
