FEBRUARY OPENINGS

Feb. 1*- CALDER: 19 GIFTS FROM THE ARTIST. An exhibition of mobiles, stabiles, wire portraits and jewelry, dating from the late '20s to 1964. Part of the continuing series of small shows reporting on acquisitions to the Museum Collections. Installed by Dorothy C. Miller, Curator, Museum Collections. 1st floor, gallery 1.

JERRY UELSMANN. Making frank and visible use of multiple-printing techniques, Uelsmann's work challenges the basic assumption of "straight photography." Directed by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography. Edward Steichen Center, 3rd floor.

NEW DOCUMENTS. A new genus of documentary photographers has emerged in the last decade as shown in this exhibition of 90 photographs by Diane Arbus, Lee Friedlander and Garry Winogrand. Using the techniques and aesthetics of the documentary approach, their ends are fundamentally private rather than social. Their purpose is to understand rather than pursuade; their pictures are understated, skeptical and often witty. Co-sponsored by the City March 13 of New York, the exhibition reviews the problems and possibilities of urban planning with particular reference to Manhattan. Projects designed by four teams of young architects (members of the architecture faculties at Cornell, Columbia, Princeton, and M.I.T.) have been commissioned by the Museum to illustrate the role of architectural planning in relation to social and economic problems confronting American cities.
