ARCHITECTURAL FANTASIES: DRAWINGS FROM THE MUSEUM COLLECTION. These drawings and photomontages by three Viennese architects - Hans Hollein, Walter Pichler, and Raymond Abraham - were acquired by the Museum during the last four years. All of them are concerned with machines and their metamorphoses into colossal buildings. Such objects as an aircraft carrier, a turbine, or a spark plug, transformed into cities or monuments, present images with ambiguous but vaguely menacing overtones. Selected by Arthur Drexler, Director, Department of Architecture & Design. 2nd floor, gallery 20.

RECENT ACQUISITIONS: PHOTOGRAPHY 1967. A group of about 33 photographs acquired during 1967, spanning a period of 70 years and including works by Frederick H. LYONEL FEININGER: The Ruin By The Sea. During the summer of 1928, the American painter Feininger discovered the ruins of a 14th century Gothic church on the Baltic coast of Pomerania. His fascination with its architecture occupied him throughout his life and is illustrated by a series of drawings and watercolors as well as a painting, all recently acquired by the Museum. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Director, and Eila Kokkinen, Curatorial Assistant, Department of Drawings & Prints. 1st floor, gallery 5.

The exhibition will include a number of the original mutoscopes from the collection of Douglass Crockwell of Glens Falls, N.Y., as well as original "flip books" and enlarged "flip book" stills. Directed by Margareta Akermarck, Associate Director, Department of Film, and installed by Clyde R. Rich, Jr., an architect on the Museum's staff. Auditorium Gallery.

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM. Twenty-five witty and brilliantly colored collages and drawings by Jim Dine for a modern interpretation of William Shakespeare's play. In addition to the original designs for decor and costumes, photographs of the production in 1966 are included. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Director, and Virginia Allen, Assistant, Department of Drawings and Prints. 1st floor, gallery 6.

RECENT ACQUISITIONS: DESIGN COLLECTION. A selection of approximately 35 items ranging from large pieces of furniture to electrical equipment and appliances, household items and accessories, sports equipment, packages, toys and crafts, acquired during the last five years. Directed by Arthur Drexler, Director, and Mildred Constantine, Associate Curator, Graphic Design, Dept. of Architecture & Design. 1st floor, gallery 1.

PICASSO SCULPTURE. A complete survey of Picasso's sculpture consisting in large part of works from the artist's collection, never before shown in the United States. 160 works in bronze, wood, terra cotta, painted sheet metal and ceramics. Selected by Sir Roland Penrose, President of the London Institute of Contemporary Art; installed by René d'Harnoncourt Director, The Museum of Modern Art. 1st fl., Main Hall, gall. 1,3 & 4.

THE 1960s: PAINTING AND SCULPTURE FROM THE MUSEUM COLLECTION. The 127 works in the exhibition have been selected and installed by Dorothy C. Miller, Curator of the Museum Collections, with the help of Betsy Jones, Assistant Curator. Among them are 32 recent acquisitions, not previously shown, and 16 paintings and sculptures lent by Philip Johnson who has promised them as future gifts to the Museum. Over 100 artists from 16 countries are represented. The works in the show were chosen to illustrate the contemporary movements, styles and the forms of expression which seem most characteristic of the current decade. Included are works influenced by dada and surrealism, many of them using assemblage technique; "stain" or "color-field" painting; systemic painting; hard-edge abstraction and the shaped canvas; optical and kinetic art; "primary" sculpture; and various forms of realism and "pop." 1st floor, galleries 3 & 4 and the Sculpture Garden. ONCE INVISIBLE. The exhibition attempts to define those areas in which our modern visual "vocabulary" has been extended by, and is dependent on, photographic imagery. Approximately 150 examples include aerial scanning photography, time-lapse photography, stop-action photography and electron microscopy. Most but not all of the work in the exhibition has been produced in response to a scientific motivation. Selected by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography. 1st floor, gallery 2. (Opened June 20)

- Through Sept. 4 CALDER: 19 GIFTS FROM THE ARTIST. An exhibition of mobiles, stabiles, wire portraits and jewelry, dating from the late '20s to 1964. Part of the continuing series of small shows reporting on acquisitions to the Museum Collections. Installed by Dorothy Miller, Curator, Museum Collections. 1st floor, gallery 1. (Opened Feb. 1)
- Through Sept. THE ARTIST AS HIS SUBJECT. A special exhibition of 52 prints representing artists and their artist friends from 1890 to today.
DRAWINGS: RECENT ACQUISITIONS. Some 50 drawings including works by Giacometti, Kiesler, Matisse, Picasso, Redon and Rodin. Installed by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings and Prints. The Paul J. Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor. (Opened June 6)
- Through summer GUERNICA, STUDIES AND POSTSCRIPTS. To commemorate the 30th anniversary of Picasso's famous mural the Museum is exhibiting 38 preliminary drawings and 16 postscripts in the gallery where Guernica is installed. Guernica, the studies and the postscripts have been on extended loan from the artist since 1939. Installed by Alfred H. Barr, Jr., Director, Museum Collections. 3rd floor, gallery 4. (Opened June 2)
- Through July 16 HABITAT. A large model and photographs of Montreal's 12-story housing project; a complex of 354 steel-reinforced, pre-cast concrete boxes which are laid out to form 158 interlocking private houses. The Canadian Corporation for Expo '67 has made it possible to construct a unique housing type which, until now, existed only in theoretical discussions. Designed by Israeli-born architect, Moshe Safdie, Habitat offers solutions to the problems of high-density housing as well as prefabrication. Installed by Arthur Drexler, Director, Department of Architecture & Design. 1st floor, galleries 5 & 6. (Opened June 1)
- Through July 16 A EUROPEAN EXPERIMENT. Photographs in unique prints or limited editions, by Pierre Cordier, Denis Brihat and Jean-Pierre Sudre. From Galerie Les Contards, Provence. Directed by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography. Edward Steichen Center, 3rd floor. (Opened April 26)
- Through July 16 STILLS FROM THE CZECHOSLOVAK FILM FESTIVAL. An exhibition of 85 stills (16 in color) presented on the occasion of the current film series. Directed by Willard Van Dyke, Director, Department of Film, and installed by Kathleen Haven, Graphics Coordinator. Auditorium Gallery. (Opened June 14)
