Sir Roland, who served as guest director of the exhibition, is Chairman of The Institute of Contemporary Arts in London and author of "Picasso: His Life and Work." OCTOBER OPENINGS

Oct. 11-Jan. 1 THE SCULPTURE OF PICASSO. A complete survey of Picasso's sculpture consisting in large part of works from the artist's collection, never before shown in the United States. More than 200 works in bronze, wood, terra cotta, painted sheet metal, ceramics, and drawings and prints. Selected by Roland Penrose, Chairman of the Institute of Contemporary Art, London; installed by René d'Harnoncourt, Director, The Museum of Modern Art. 1st floor, Main Hall, galleries 1 \$2.4,5.6.

PRINTS BY PICASSO: A SELECTION FROM 60 YEARS. Picasso's involvement with prints began in 1899 and spans his artistic career. This selection of some 50 prints in various media features many of Picasso's finest graphic representations from 1904 through 1965, including the great etching, Minotauromachy of 1935. Chosen from the Museum's collection on the occasion of the exhibition "Sculpture of Picasso," this group of prints suggests Picasso's constant preoccupation with the human figure, as well as with the theme and conflict of the bull, the horse and the minotaur. In addition, a selection of etchings from the series The Sculptor's Studio is exhibited on the first floor. Selected by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings and Prints. Paul J. Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor.

Oct. 23-Dec. 3 THE STAR VEHICLE: THE MAKING OF A MOVIE. An exhibition of film stills and on-location shots revealing how a director organizes the creative energies of his cast and crew into a machine to make a movie, in this instance, The Comedian, starring Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton. Directed by Willard Van Dyke, Director, Department of Film. Auditorium Gallery.

Oct. 24-Dec. RAY K. METZKER. Ray K. Metzker's large wall photographs are created not primarily by enlargement, but by accretion, in which the techniques of multiple exposure and collage are combined to produce a work not merely larger in size but more complex in formal relationships and in content. THE EDWARD STEICHEN PHOTOGRAPHY CENTER. A new exhibition of works in the collection consisting of over 150 photographs dating from the 1850's to the present, though mostly 20th century. The exhibition is developed stylistically rather than strictly chronologically and consists in part of a group of small one-man exhibitions by such photographers as Eugene Atget, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Walker Evans, Dorothea Lange, Man Ray, Charles Sheeler and Alfred Stieglitz. The exhibition concludes with a section of the work of younger photographers representing the major contemporary preoccupations within the photographic medium. Third floor.
