WORD AND IMAGE: Posters and Typography from the Graphic Design Collection of The Museum of Modern Art 1879-1967. The first major exhibition of the Museum's collection of posters selected for their quality and historical significance. Beginning with the work of the 1890's, the exhibition continues with the German Bauhaus, the Russian Suprematists, the French movement of the 30's, war posters, and recent work from almost every country. Other examples of graphic design on view will include signs, letterheads, brochures, pamphlets, book jackets, record album covers, and other combinations of printed word and image. 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SCENES FROM THE OLD TESTAMENT: Forty prints by 20th century artists March 26-May 12 illustrating biblical themes. Among the painters and sculptors included are Baskin, Corinth, Dine, Nolde, Pascin, Picasso and Rohlfs. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings & Prints. Auditorium Gallery.

March 27-DADA, SURREALISM AND THEIR HERITAGE. The exhibition will cover dada June 9 beginnings in 1912, continue with the surrealist painting of the 20's (Mird, Ernst, Masson), the illusionist painters of the 30's, the surrealist sculpture of Giacometti and Arp, and later surrealists (Matta, Lam, and Gorky). The "Heritage" section will deal with the way these ideas have been assimilated by later artists. Directed by William S. Rubin, Curator of Painting & Sculpture. 1st floor, galleries 1,2,3 & 4.

Through FRANK O'HARA/IN MEMORY OF MY FEELINGS. The Museum, and the world of Jan. 28 art at large, suffered a great loss in the accidental death on July 25, 1966, of Frank O'Hara, the poet who was also Associate Curator of Painting and Sculpture. The Museum has published "In Memory of My Feelings," a special volume of 30 of O'Hara's finest poems, each illustrated by such distinguished artist friends as de Kooning, Johns, Motherwell, Newman, and Rauschenberg. The 30 poems in the book and over 50 drawings for them are on view in the Pual J. Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor. directed by William Berkson, editor of the book, and Riva Castleman, Assistant Curator, Department of Drawings & Prints. (Opened Dec. 5)

PRINTS BY PICASSO: A SELECTION FROM 60 YEARS. Fifty prints in various Jan. 28 media featuring many of Picasso's finest graphic representations from 1904 through 1965, including the great etching, Minotauromachy of 1935, chosen from the Museum's collection. Selected by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings & Prints. Paul J. Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor. (Opened Oct. 11)

Through ARCHITECTURAL FANTASIES: DRAWINGS FROM THE MUSEUM COLLECTION. Drawings and photomontages by three young Viennese architects, Hans Hollein, Jan. Walter Pichler, and Raimund Abraham. Selected by Arthur Drexler, Director, Department of Architecture & Design. 2nd floor, gallery 20. (Opened July 27).

> RAY K. METZKER. Ray K. Metzker's large photographic works explore the aesthetic of the multiplied image. They are constructed from modular photographic elements varied through techniques such as cropping, multiple exposure, and tone control. In a typical work the modules merge into a rich formal relationship. Selected by John Szarkowski, Director, Photography Department, Edward Steichen Center, 3rd floor. (Opened Oct. 25)

Through-THE EDWARD STEICHEN PHOTOGRAPHY CENTER. An exhibition of works in the collection consisting of over 150 photographs dating from the 1850's to the present, though mostly 20th century. The exhibition is developed year stylistically rather than strictly chronologically and consists in part of a group of small one-man exhibitions by such photographers as Eugène Atget, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Walker Evans, Dorothea Lange, Man Ray, Charles Sheeler and Alfred Stieglitz.
