New Exhibitions

JIM DINE DESIGNS FOR A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM AND THE PICTURE OF DORIAN GRAY

Directed by Virginia Allen, Assistant to the Director of The Museum of Modern Art's Department of Drawings and Prints, JIM DINE DESIGNS FOR A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM was first presented at The Museum of Modern Art in 1967, and has been traveling since throughout the United States and Canada under the auspices of the Museum's Circulating Exhibition Program. The designs for The Picture of Dorian Gray are presented in depth for the first time. This combined exhibition of approximately 50 drawings affords a unique opportunity to examine Dine's complete "post-happening" involvement with the performing arts. The exhibition will begin a tour of Europe at the Kunstverein in Munich on October 24 under the auspices of the Museum's International Council.

NEW PHOTOGRAPHY: U.S.A.

This exhibition directed by the Museum's Director of Photography John Szarkowski contains 110 photographs by eleven photographers including Paul Caponigro, Ray Metzker and Garry Winogrand. The photographs in the exhibition have been produced "not for the market but rather in response to the photographer's personal understanding of photography's potential: their sense of how past achievements have defined present possibilities." The exhibition will circulate in two versions throughout Latin America and Europe under the auspices of the Museum's International Council, beginning in October.

TAMARIND: HOMAGE TO LITHOGRAPHY

The 100 lithographs in this exhibition, selected from more than 2,500 produced at the Tamarind Workshop in Los Angeles, include prints by Josef Albers, Louise Nevelson, Nicholas Krushenick, and Sam Francis. Directed by William Lieberman, Director, and Virginia Allen, Assistant to the Director, of the Museum's Department of Drawings and Prints, the show will begin a tour of Latin America in November.
