- *Mar. 10 JOAN MIRO: FIFTY RECENT PRINTS. Fifty etchings executed by the Spanish artist in the three years preceding his seventy-fifth birthday in 1968. The circulating exhibition, organized by Riva Castleman, Assistant Curator for Prints and Illustrated Books, has been drawn from the archive of the Galerie Maeght in Paris and includes seven works being exhibited for the first time. - *Mar. 18 THEO VAN DOESBURG AS ARCHITECT. Theo van Doesburg, born in Utrecht, Holland, in 1883, was an active and versatile champion of modernism in Holland in the 1920's. A painter and sculptor as well as an architect, he founded the DeStijl group with Piet Mondrian, Vilmos Huszar, the architect J.J.P. Oud, and the essayist Antony Kok. This exhibition, directed by Ludwig Glaeser, Curator, Department of Architecture and Design, presents a selection of some three dozen original drawings representative of van Doesburg's

architectural ideas. In addition to the designs for the interiors of the cafe-restaurant "L'Aubette," completed in 1927 in Strasbourg, the exhibition also includes all existing studies done in 1923 with van Eesteren for the famous exhibition of the DeStijl group in Leonce Rosenberg's gallery L'Effort Moderne in Paris. In these projects, which were titled "Analyse de l'Architecture (contre-construction)", van Doesburg reduces architecture to its planar elements using color to define space. They are now regarded as one of the most important influences on the development of the International Style in modern architecture. Goodwin Galleries, 2nd floor.

*Mar. 26 May 31 FRANK STELLA. When Stella's Black Paintings were first shown in 1959, they seemed to have come virtually from nowhere, to have no stylistic heritage, and to represent a rejection of everything that painting seemed to be. Increasingly over the years these paintings — and Stella's subsequent work—have revealed their deep and manifold roots in the tradition of modern painting. The 40 works in this exhibition — ranging from his earliest pieces to the ongoing Protractor and Saskatchewan series — show the breathtaking stylistic variety and range of feeling that mark Stella as an artist who in only one decade has forged one of the few genuinely new directions in non-figurative art. The exhibition, directed by William S. Rubin, Chief Curator, Painting and Sculpture Collection, is scheduled to travel in the United States and abroad. 1st floor.
