working under Griffith followed his style. "The Last Man on Earth" is set in 1950, by which time all men presumably were to be eliminated by a strange disease called "masculitis;" everything, including the Congress of the United States, is run by women. Directed by J.B. Blystone, the picture is, of course, a comedy, possibly in anticipation of today's Women's Liberation Movement.
