German Art in New York Collections: proceded by a brief resume of work by German artists shown at the Museum of Modern Art during its first year of existence(1929-1930)

In accordance with its policy of presenting what it feels to be significant works of modern art in its international aspects, the Museum of Modern art in New York presented in loan exhibitions during its first year sculpture and painting by two outstanding figures of twentieth century German art, Wilhelm Lehmbruck and Taul Klee, and aroused much interest by including in its second loan exhibition of Nineteen Living Americans work by Lyonel Feininger, an American citizen whose importance in the history of contemporary German painting requires no comment.

For its first exhibition of sculpture the Museum selected the work of only two men, behabruck and Maillel. The heroic "Standing woman" by Lehabruck (photograph accompanying) from the permanent collection of the Museum of Modern art was supplemented by seven other examples of Lehabruck's work borrowed from museums and private collections in the United States.

In its fourth loan exhibition the Juseum devoted one of its galleries to the showing of sixty-three oils, watercolors, gouaches, and drawings by Faul Klee in what constituted the first one-man exhibition of Klee's work in America. With the impetus given by the exhibition at the Museum Klee's work was introduced into a number of important private collections in New York.

The inclusion of Lyonel Feininger in the exhibition of Nineteen Living emericans was hotly disputed in many quarters, but the result of much debate Seemed to be clear proof of the international character of contemporary painting and the impossibility of drawing sharp national lines in the mobility of modern society.

During the first year the museum was fortunate in securing a sucleus for the permanent collection of important works of modern art which the hopes to create. Two of the twelve works as wired were by Jerman sculpture, behabruck and Rudolf Beiling, and one by the Jerman-Bwiss, Herman Haller.

The helmbrack in the permanent collection of the Museum is the large Standing Woman mentioned above. The original plaster of this figure was purchased by Mr. Stephen C. Clark when it was shown at the armory Exhibition which served to introduce contemporary suropean art to the american public in 1913. When the plaster showed signs of disintegration Mr. Clark had a single bronze casting made and destroyed the original plaster so that the cast given to the Museum by Mr. Clark is unique in America.

The Belling owned by the Museum is a three-quarters bust of the prize-fighter, Max Schmeling, and was mamma given by Mr. Alfred Flechtheim of Berlin. It is interesting in showing Belling's mastery of sculptural portraiture, and demonstrates an aspect of his work such less known than the castracts with which his name is usually associated.

The Haller in the permanent collection is a small bronze figure of a woman standing with her hands on her hips and head thwown back with the combination of grace and strength characteristic of the sculptor.

Outside the Museum of Modern Art. New York is surprisingly rich in examples of modern German art considering the great preponderance of interest in contemporary French painters and sculptors that grew up during and after the war of 1913-1948. There follows an alphabetical list of New York private collectors owning twentieth century German art, with the names of the more important artists represented.
