- July 8 RECENT ACQUISITIONS: DRAWINGS. This selection highlights a group of recent acquisitions made possible through a matching grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to purchase drawings by living American artists. Several related gifts of works by younger European artists are included as well. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings. 1st floor.
- July 24 PROJECTS: MARLENE SCOTT V. Another in the series of exhibitions resept. 8 porting on recent developments in contemporary art. Using lines made out of cord and various tapes, Marlene Scott V. creates three-dimensional drawings into which the spectator can enter. Supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. Directed by Martha Beck, Curatorial Assistant, Department of Drawings. 1st floor.
- late Aug.-GODS, HEROES AND SHEPHERDS. Ancient Greek and Roman tales have continued Nov. 10 to fascinate and inspire artists. This selection from the Collection offers prints and illustrated books by artists such as Bonnard, Braque, Maillol and Picasso who have illustrated the classics in the modern idiom. PROJECTS: SONIA LANDY SHERIDAN & KEITH SMITH. Continuing the series of exhibitions reporting on new developments in art are large color photographs by these two artists. Their pictures are derived from the 3M color-in-color process, from which the original color image has been transferred by heat, often on a greatly enlarged modular grid, to cloth. Sonia Landy Sheridan and Keith Smith are both on the faculty of the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Projects is supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. Directed by Dennis Longwell, Assistant Curator, Department of Photography. 1st floor. (opened June 4)

through Aug. 11 PRINTED, CUT, FOLDED AND TORN. An exhibition from the Museum Collection of works by artists who have explored and utilized the specific qualities of paper. Paper is manipulated before, during or after the printing process, or is altered and presented as the final work of art. Approximately sixty prints and illustrated books are shown by twenty artists including Iain Baxter, Lucio Fontana, Sam Gilliam, Alan Shields, Antoni Tapies, and Richard Tuttle. Directed by Howardena Pindell, Assistant Curator, Prints and Illustrated Books. Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor. (opened May 10)

PHOTOGRAPHS FROM THE HARVARD SOCIAL ETHICS COLLECTION. Approximately Aug. 31 50 prints selected from the exhibition The Social Question: A Photographic Record 1895-1910 held at the Carpenter Center for the Visual Arts last fall. That exhibition contained 220 photographs chosen from the several thousand collected early in this century by F. G. Peabody, founder of the Social Ethics Department of Harvard University. Directed by John Szarkowski, Director, Department of Photography. Steichen Galleries, 3rd floor. (opened June 18)

through Sept. 8 SEURAT TO MATISSE: DRAWING IN FRANCE. Beginning in the 1880s with Seurat and Redon and concluding with the death of Matisse in 1954, this exhibition of almost 200 works surveys in depth seven decades of drawing in France. The selection offers many new acquisitions and several promised gifts and includes artists not always associated with the School of Paris, among them Calder, Delvaux, Feininger, Grosz, Kiesler, Nadelman, Severini and Tchelitchew. An important feature is the examples of innovative techniques of draftsmanship exploited during the twentieth century, such as collage and automatic-drawing. Among other artists represented are Archipenko, Braque, Cézanne, Dubuffet, van Gogh, Gris and Picasso. Seurat to Matisse is supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings. 1st floor. (opened June 13)

Selected and installed by Arthur Drexler, Director, Architecture and Design. Goodwin Galleries, 2nd floor. (Opened Feb. 1)

THE MUSEUM COLLECTIONS

Painting and Sculpture. The exhibition of the painting and sculpture collection begins on the second floor with Cezanne and continues through the great historical movements of the 20th century -- Cubism, Expressionism, Futurism, and the School of Paris. On the third floor the galleries are devoted to Dada and Surrealism, post-war European work, Abstract Expressionism, and related art from the early fifties. Four galleries are set aside for sculpture from 1880 to 1960. Ground-floor galleries exclusively for work executed since the mid-1950s bring the exhibition of the collection up to date, and include recent acquisitions of works by Tim Scott, Robert Natkin, Christopher Wilmarth and Jan Dibbets. This presentation has been made possible in part by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. Directed by William Rubin, Director, Painting and Sculpture.
