

Sep 5 - DRAWINGS: RECENT ACQUISITIONS. Additions to the Collection of works
 Nov 9 by painters and sculptors, including Max Ernst, Feininger, Giacometti,
 van der Leck, Léger, Modigliani, Rivera, Szafran, as well as gifts
 from The Lauder Foundation. Selected by William S. Lieberman, Director
 Department of Drawings. 1st floor.

- Sep 11 76 JEFFERSON. Since the early 1960s artists and musicians have been living and working at 76 Jefferson Street on New York's Lower East Side, attracted by its low rent, good light, and somewhat isolated location. This Art Lending Service exhibition presents painting, sculpture and other works by 17 of these artists, as well as silkscreer prints done by Chiron Press at 76 Jefferson from 1963 through 1967. Made possible by a grant from Harveys Bristol Cream. Directed by Richard Marshall, Selections Advisor to the Art Lending Service. Penthouse, 6th floor.
- Sep 12 PROJECTS: WALTER PICHLER. More than 40 drawings of projects by Walte Oct 28 Pichler (b. 1936), one of Austria's most important artists, whose work of the last decade has had a great and pervasive influence on the European architectural and design avant-garde. Directed by Emilio Ambasz, Curator, Design, Department of Architecture and Design. 1st floor.

Oct 3 - PRINTSEQUENCE. Inherent in the technology of the print media is the Jan 18 possibility of infinite variation. This exhibition of prints published during the last fifteen years focuses on the sequential development of more than a dozen series, each of which contains one invariable. Works by Albers, Bass, Johns and Warhol are included. Directed by Riva Castleman, Curator, Prints and Illustrated Books. Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor.

Oct 29 -THE ARCHITECTURE OF THE ECOLE DES BEAUX-ARTS. This exhibition and Jan 4 its accompanying publication will examine the body of ideas and buildings against which the modern movement rebelled. The material, primarily drawings, often enormous in size, and many never before Press seen by the public, has been culled from thousands of student project Preview stowed away in the attic of the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris. Inclu Oct 27 is work by students who subsequently established their preeminence as llam-4pm professional architects -- Henri Labrouste, architect of the Biblioth Nationale, and Charles Garnier, architect of the Paris Opera, among others -- and projects revealing the sources of much pioneering work in the U.S. by such architects as H. H. Richardson and Louis Sullivan The distinguished drawings executed for the Prix de Rome and other competitions, as well as certain standard assignments, will be supplemented by photographs of major executed work in France and the United States. Made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. Directed by Arthur Drexler, Director, Department of Architecture and Design. 1st floor.

- Nov 1 PROJECTS: VIDEO VI. Continuing series reporting on recent develop-Jan 30 ments in this medium. Selected by Barbara London, Curatorial Assistant, Department of Prints and Illustrated Books. Auditorium Gallery, Mon-Sat 11-2:00; Sun 12-2:00.
- Nov 20 NEW DESIGN ACQUISITIONS. A selection of objects acquired since 1973
 Jan 25 for the Design Collection, with emphasis placed on work by craftsmen. Included are a wrought iron grill from Antoni Gaudi's Casa Milá in Barcelona, objects by Tiffany and Majorelle from the Joseph H. Heil Bequest, and a group of recent English ceramics. Directed by Arthur Drexler, Director, Department of Architecture and Design. 1st floor.
- Nov 20 EUGENE BUECHEL, S.J.: ROSEBUD AND PINE RIDGE PHOTOGRAPHS, 1922-42.
 Jan 18 An exhibition prepared by David Wing and the Grossmont College Summer Photography Workshop in cooperation with the Buechel Memorial Lakota Museum in St. Francis, South Dakota. Approximately 40 photographs by Eugene Buechel, who spent 50 years as pastor and teacher at the St. Francis and Holy Rosary Missions in South Dakota. Steichen Galleries, 3rd floor.
- Jan 21 RECENT DRAWINGS: 1955-1975. Approximately 175 works on paper dating
 Mar 7 from the late 1950s to the early 1970s, concentrating on the 1960s and
 reflecting changes in both the use of drawing and the artist's attitude
 toward the medium. International in scope, the exhibition will be comprised of works in traditional as well as non-traditional materials
 Preview and techniques, ranging from the purely pictorial to conceptual, and
 including large-scale and three-dimensional pieces. The show will
 tour Latin America after the New York showing. Directed by Bernice
 Rose, Curator, Department of Drawings. 1st floor.
- Feb 2 CUBISM AND ITS AFFINITIES. The ramifications of cubism and futurism May 9 were considerable, and on paper sometimes unexpected. This survey, consisting of approximately 75 works on paper, begins in 1906 and closes in 1922 with main concentration on the years 1910 through 1921. The selection includes the Italian futurists as well as artists working in Czechoslovakia, Germany, Great Britain, Holland, Russia and the United States. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings. Sachs Galleries, 3rd floor.
- Feb 17 PROJECTS: MICHAEL SNOW. About 10 large photographic works by the Apr 28 Canadian artist; accompanied by Film Series (see p.6). Directed by Dennis Longwell, Assistant Curator, Department of Photography. Steichen Galleries, 3rd floor.
- Mar 24 -LES FAUVES. A major exhibition of about 70 paintings and a number of drawings by the Fauvist painters Matisse, Derain, Vlaminck, Braque, Jun 6 Dufy, van Dongen and some lesser-known artists. Included will be the so-called proto-Fauve works of Matisse, Derain and Vlaminck -- those Press Preview of a highly Fauve nature painted in some cases years before the famous Mar 22 autumn salon of 1905 that gave Fauvism its name and established the commonly accepted date for the beginning of the movement. llam-4pm The exhibition will also trace the development of Braque, Derain and Vlaminck as they passed progressively out of Fauvism under the influence of Cézanne and of Cubism. Made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. 1st floor.

FUTURE OPENINGS (continued)

ANDRE MASSON. With the exceptions of Picasso and Miro, Andre Masson Jun 1 had a greater influence on the development of the generation of Aug 15 American artists who became known as Abstract Expressionists than any other single artist. One of Masson's finest, most productive periods took place in America where he spent the war years. Nevertheless, his contribution to American artists and his own accomplishments are known to a limited, largely professional public. Approximately 65 paintings and 30 drawings will be exhibited with particular emphasis on the period from 1925 to 1928 and the American period from 1941 to 1945. An illustrated publication with two essays, one dealing with Masson's role in modern art as a whole, and the other detailing his development and iconography will appear in conjunction with the show. Following its New York showing, the exhibition will travel in the United States. Directed by William Rubin, Director, Department of Painting and Sculpture. 1st floor.

THE CITY TAXI. Four totally new working prototypes of city taxicabs Jun 30 -Sep 6 designed to "improve the quality of urban life" will be exhibited by the Museum -- two being built by Volvo and Volkswagen at the Museum's invitation and two by AMF, Inc. and Steam Power Systems Press under a contract from the U.S. Department of Transportation. The Preview prototypes, actual working cars, will meet design standards developed Jun 28 by the New York City Taxi and Limousine Commission. The Program, llam-4pm one of the most potentially far reaching ever launched by the Museum, is intended to promote the manufacture and introduction of a more suitable taxicab before the end of the decade. Made possible by grants from the Urban Mass Transportation Administration of the U. S. Department of Transportation and Mobil Oil Corporation. Directed by Emilio Ambasz, Curator, Design, Department of Architecture and Design. 1st floor.

through A JACQUES VILLON CENTENNIAL. One of France's most important modern Sep 21 printmakers, Jacques Villon (1875-1963), is remembered mainly for his Cubist etchings. This 100th anniversary exhibition of prints

MODERN MASTERS: MANET TO MATISSE. Originally organized for showings in Australia under the auspices of the Museum's International Council, this exhibition includes so many important loans from 25 public and 36 private collections in this country and Europe that special arrangements have been made to present it in New York before the works are returned to their owners. Among the masters from private collections are Balthus, Bonnard, Cezanne, Dali, Derain, Gauguin, Giacometti, Gris, Klee, Leger, Magritte, Malevich, Miró, Monet, Picasso, Redon, Rouault and Vuillard. Le Musée National d'Art Moderne, Paris, has lent ten paintings; major museums in 13 states have also been generous. Made possible by a grant from Alcoa Foundation. Directed by William S. Lieberman, Director, Department of Drawings. Rene d'Harnoncourt Galleries, 1st floor. (opened Aug 4)
