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pROJECTS: VIDEO XIII, the latest in The Museum of Modern Art's continuing video series, is being shown in the Auditorium Gallery through October 16, 1977. The current program has been selected by Barbara London, Curatorial Assistant in charge of the fuseum's video program, and consists of tapes made in the past year by New York artists involvement with video reaches back to the early seventies.

Several Minutes of Several Days in the Hamptons was produced by Ira Schneider, a co-founder Radical Software (1970-74), the magazine devoted to independent video. Several Minutes a straightforward, reflective work that deals with the natural habitation of a small ction of Long Island. Bill *V*iola, who began his involvement with video at the Synapse udio in Syracuse and later became technical director of Art/Tapes/22 in Florence, made ur Songs at the WNET—TV Lab over the last year. Viola's work consists of tightly ited sequences in which sound and visuals are integrally synchronized. Ron Clark eated his Dialectical Facts with Fifi Corday Productions. Clark feels the work "is ant to be a look at dialectical events as they manifest themselves in a cinematic ntext.... The subject of the tape is politics: political thought and political fact." ith Sonnier recently collaborated with Liza Bear on Phase 1: Send/Receive Satellite etwork. "The visual structure of the tape is made of three 2-dimensional sets created rom satellite and television iconography: antennae, earth stations, transmission mards and diagrams, headlines and columns of print from communications journals of the Mirties and seventies.... While the first set compares the satellite industry now to plevision in the mid-thirties, the second focuses on the shifting balance of power Petween government and industry and the limits of citizen access, and the third points  $ull^{
m pt}$  some of the implications for human communication created by satellite technology."
