RENE CLAIR: FROM THE ARCHIVES OF THE MUSEUM OF MODERN ART OPENS OCT. 4

12 films by RENE CLAIR, one of the most celebrated and "the most French of all filmmakers" (according to noted film scholar and historian Georges Sadoul) will be screened in French without English subtitles at The Museum of Modern Art beginning Thursday October 4 and running through Monday October 22, 1979.

Famous for both his key avant-garde works and his stylish comedies, Clair is recognized for his innovative use of sound in the early 1930's. The films in this exhibition, all from The Museum's extensive Film Archives, are from the period 1923 through 1960 and represent more than one third of the master filmmaker's work in France and America.

In her essay which accompanies the exhibition and is adapted from her forthcoming book on René Clair, Celia McGerr writes: "Clair's artistic vision is one of the most affirmative the screen has ever known. A Clair film can give the spectator a sense of joy, for Clair believes in love, in the ability and desire of a friend to help a friend, and in the essential goodness of humanity."

Films are free to the public with Museum admission or membership. The film program is made possible in part by public funds from The New York State Council on the Arts and by a grant from The National Endowment for the Arts.
