WHAT'S HAPPENING? 13TH SEASON OF INDEPENDENT DOCUMENTARIES ADDRESSES TOPICAL ISSUES

On Tuesday, October 4, the weekly WHAT'S HAPPENING? series will begin its thirteenth season as a showcase for independently made films on political and social issues. In many cases these films, which bring a fresh and controversial viewpoint to a variety of issues, receive their premiere New York showing in the series. All screenings begin on Tuesday evenings at 6:00 p.m. in the Roy and Niuta Titus Theater 2.

This season will begin with <u>La Operacion</u>, a film by Anna Maria Garcia on the promotion of sterilization as a means for birth control among Puerto Rican women. The filmmaker asserts that one-third of the women of child-bearing age in Puerto Rico have been sterilized, at an average age of 26; the procedure is so common that women refer to it simply as <u>la operacion</u>. On the same program will be Stephanie Palewski's <u>DES:</u>
The Timebomb Drug, a report on the long-term threat that this drug poses to women's health.

Among the other highlights of the season will be <u>Out of Order</u>, a film portrait of former nuns who have left the convent, co-directed by Diane Christian, who was herself a nun; <u>Moving On: The Hunger for Land in Zimbabwe</u>, winner of the Grierson Award at the 1983 American Film Festival for its depiction of the complexities of land redistribution in Africa, told through the contrasting stories of two farm families, one black and one white; and <u>Silver Valley</u>, a look at an unemployed family in Idaho living in a present-day James Agee-Walker Evans world. A program on November 15 will focus on nuclear issues: <u>Washington to Moscow Peacewalk</u> documents the beginnings of the nuclear freeze campaign in New England in 1981 (the <u>Washington</u> and <u>Moscow</u> of the title are both in Vermont); <u>Button</u>, <u>Button</u>: A <u>Dream of Nuclear War</u> shows a pageant play written and performed by people in Strafford, Vermont; <u>Harrisburg</u> re-creates the mood of the time of the Three Mile Island incident through the use of TV, radio, and newspaper coverage; and <u>Gods of Metal</u>

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is an Academy Award-nominated film on the arms race, sponsored by the Maryknoll Missioners.

Programs in the latter portion of the 13th season of WHAT'S HAPPENING? will be announced at a later date.

The films presented in WHAT'S HAPPENING? are selected by William Sloan, Librarian of the Circulating Film Library, Department of Film. The Museum's film programs are made possible by public funds from the National Endowment for the Arts and the New York State Council on the Arts.
