WHAT'S HAPPENING? SERIES OF SOCIAL AND POLITICAL FILMS RESUMES AT MOMA WITH NINOS DESAPARECIDOS AND BOMBAY OUR CITY OCTOBER 9

Estela Bravo's <u>Ninos Desaparecidos</u> (1985) and Anand Patwardhan's <u>Bombay Our</u> <u>City</u> (1985) lead off the fall season of WHAT'S HAPPENING? at The Museum of Modern Art on Thursday, October 9, at 3:00 and 6:30 p.m. This is the sixteenth season of the series of independently made films on social and political issues.

<u>Ninos Desaparecidos</u> is a documentary about the children who disappeared during the military dictatorship in Argentina. In <u>Bombay Our City</u> the filmmaker explores the struggle for housing in the slums of Bombay.

Other programs this fall include David Sutherland's <u>Jack Levine: Feast of Pure Reason</u> (1986) on October 23; Lionel Rogosin's <u>Come Back Africa</u> (1960) on October 30; a Tribute to the International Documentary Association on November 20; and Peter Davis's The Rise and Fall of the Borscht Belt (1986) on December 18.

Each film will be screened twice, at 3:00 and 6:30 p.m., in the Museum's Roy and Niuta Titus Theater 2 (complete schedule attached). Most programs are held on Thursday, when admission to the Museum is on a pay-as-you-wish basis after 5:00 p.m.
