MAJOR PUBLICATION TO ACCOMPANY BERLINART 1961-1987 EXHIBITION

The Museum of Modern Art has published a major catalog to accompany BERLINART 1961-1987, the first comprehensive exhibition in the United States to examine Berlin as a center of contemporary artistic activity. Edited and with an introduction by Kynaston McShine, senior curator in the Department of Painting and Sculpture and organizer of the exhibition, the fully-illustrated book assesses Berlin's important contributions to recent art history.

Mr. McShine's introduction to <u>BERLINART 1961-1987</u> is followed by six essays that offer a critical account of artistic movements in Berlin, including: "Art in Berlin 1900-1937," by John Willett, an authority on Bertolt Brecht and the modern movement in Germany; "Typical and Unique: Art in Berlin 1945-1970," by Wieland Schmied, professor of art history at the Akademie der bildenden Künste, Munich, and former director of the Berlin Artists Program of the DAAD program; "Fluxus and Fluxism in Berlin 1964-1976," by René Block, an independent curator and director of Berlin's DAAD Gallery; "Visitors to a City in Exile," by Karl Ruhrberg, professor of art history and former director of the DAAD; "Hints of Utopia: Art in Berlin since 1977," by Michael Schwarz, professor of art history at the Hochschule fur bildende Künste, Braunschweig; and "Berlin and Film," by Laurence Kardish, curator in the Department of Film at The Museum of Modern Art and organizer of BERLINART: 20 FILMS.

Over 400 works of art are illustrated in the catalog. Biographies of the

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artists, a chronology of cultural and political events relating to Berlin, and a bibliography complete the volume.

Published by The Museum of Modern Art and Prestel Verlag, Munich, <u>Berlinart 1961-1987</u> was made possible by a generous grant to the Museum by The Bohen Foundation. It contains 282 pages and includes 86 color and 329 black-and-white illustrations. The clothbound edition, available in the Museum Store for \$40.00, is distributed in the United States and Canada by te Neues Publishing Company, New York; the paperbound edition is available in the Museum Store for \$25.00.
