Oldenburg, director of The Museum of Modern Art, announced today that the Museum has received a generous grant from Springs Industries, Inc., to underwrite THE HISTORY OF PHOTOGRAPHY exhibition, opening February 18, 1990. Organized by John Szarkowski, director, Department of Photography, the exhibition will celebrate the sesquicentennial of the public announcement in 1839 of the process of L.J.M. Daguerre, the first of photography's several inventors to make his work known to the world.

THE HISTORY OF PHOTOGRAPHY exhibition and publication are part of the Springs Industries Series on the Art of Photography at The Museum of Modern Art.
