FOCUS This is the first major retrospective of the work of Minor

White (1908-76), who is recognized as one of the most significant American photographers of the postwar period. As artist, writer, editor, and educator, White has influenced photographers and others interested in the field throughout the

world. His finely crafted photographs are considered masterworks, and his pictures are represented in all major

collections of photography.

CONTENT Largely drawn from the Minor White Archive at Princeton

University, this exhibition consists of 185 photographs that demonstrate the full range of White's work from 1938 to 1976. Many of the works, including ten rare color photographs, have never before been exhibited; others were shown only early in the

artist's career.

After its New York showing, the exhibition travels to institutions in cities where White lived and worked during his lifetime: Portland Art Museum, Oregon (September 19 - November 12, 1989); Minneapolis Institute of Art (January 20 - March 25, 1990); San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (June 22 - August 19, 1990); George Eastman House, Rochester, New York (September 21 - November 25, 1990); and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston (January - March 1991). The tour concludes in 1991 at The Art Museum,

Princeton University (April - June 1991).
