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## TWENTY-SECOND SEASON OF CINEPROBE BEGINS OCTOBER 16

The twenty-second season of CINEPROBE opens on October 16 at The Museum of Modern Art. Held on Mondays at 6:30 p.m., this series focuses on experimental works as well as on personal and unusual narratives. Filmmakers in the fall 1989 and winter 1990 season include:

October 16

David Rimmer (Vancouver)

Canadian filmmaker David Rimmer presents a program of his short, non-narrative works in which reprocessed and rephotographed images are often used. The program includes <u>As Seen on TV</u> (1986), <u>Along the Road to Altamira</u> (1986), <u>Bricolage</u> (1985), and the New York premieres of <u>Black Cat White Cat</u> (1989) and <u>Divine Mannequin</u> (1988).

October 23

Peter Herwitz (San Francisco/New York)

This program includes three recent 16mm films by Peter Herwitz which approximate the passion and mystery of music and poetry through a visual structure of rhythmic repetition. Herwitz often creates a layered effect by exposing multiple images onto the film and by altering the film's surface through painting, scratching, and bleaching. <u>The Poet's Veil</u> (1988), <u>The</u> <u>Painted Veil</u> (1988), and <u>Musique de ténèbres</u> (<u>Music of the Dark</u>) (1989), a New York premiere, are presented in this program.

November 6

Uzi Parnes (New York)

Multimedia artist Uzi Parnes presents his Super 8 and 16mm narrative films. Included in the program are <u>Girls Can't Help It!</u> (1988), a black comedy about the legality of some sexual practices; <u>Loisaida Lusts</u> (1986), a melodrama of conflicting desires set on the streets of New York's Lower East Side starring Carmelita Tropicana, Virginia Hollywood, and Charlotte Weird; and <u>Krazie Pt. 1</u> (1979), an experimental musical in which a teenage runaway blows up a power plant and becomes a media superstar, featuring Johanna Bryce.

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December 11

Laurie Dunphy (Chicago)

Laurie Dunphy presents four short films including the New York premiere of <u>Journalism Conducts a Tour</u> (1989), a humorous critique of the gestures of Newspeak unique to broadcast journalism. This program also includes <u>Lived in</u> <u>Quotes</u> (1987), a film about blacks in South Africa who survive the demands of a foreign society in their homeland; <u>A Western</u> (1987), a look at the connections between the ideology of Hollywood westerns and the United States' treatment of Puerto Rico; and <u>West Germany U.S.A.</u> (1988), a portrait of what Frankfurt means to three American GIs who are stationed there.

December 18

Marguerite Paris (New York)

This program features short Super 8 and 16mm works by Marguerite Paris, including her most recent film, <u>Haitian Initiation</u> (1989), about her lover's participation in a voodoo ceremony. Other films in the program are <u>Ghost of</u> <u>Robin Hood's Horse</u> (1982), shot in Sherwood Forest; <u>All Women Are Equal</u> (1972), starring Paul a.k.a. Paula; and <u>Welcome to Nottingham</u> (1972), about the Industrial Revolution and the exploitation of women.

January 22

Penelope Buitenhouse (Berlin)

Penelope Buitenhouse, a Canadian-born artist currently living and working in West Berlin, presents her Super 8 and 16mm films. Featured is the New York premiere of <u>They Shoot Pigs Don't They?</u> (1989), a dramatization of a revolutionary group which flees to Berlin following its attempt to take over an American television station. Other works include <u>A Dream of Naming</u> (1989), a reflection on a woman's identity; <u>Framed</u> (1986), a spoof on dramatic clichés; and <u>Disposal</u> (1984), a juxtaposition of North American disposable culture and enduring traditions.

Available tickets for CINEPROBE are free after 6:00 p.m. on the evening of each program. The series is programmed by Laurence Kardish and Adrienne Mancia, curators, and Jytte Jensen, curatorial assistant, Department of Film, The Museum of Modern Art.
