BRITISH FILM INSTITUTE: FIVE YEARS OF NEW CINEMA, 1986-1990 April 12 - 23, 1991

BRITISH FILM INSTITUTE: FIVE YEARS OF NEW CINEMA, 1986-1990, on view at The Museum of Modern Art from April 12 through 23, 1991, features twelve feature-length films and five short subjects, most of which have never before been seen in the United States. The series opens with Andrew Grieve's On the Black Hill (1988), adapted from the Bruce Chatwin novel of the same name, and Timothy Neat's and John Berger's Play Me Something (1989), a witty contemplation of Scottish story-telling set over a series of Venetian landscapes. Also included is the New York premiere of Venus Peter (1989), Ian Sellar's dreamy coming-of-age tale about a young boy in a postwar Scottish fishing village. A complete schedule of films is attached.

Individually dynamic, the films are collectively notable for the range of their aesthetic strategies and for the complex issues they address. Colin MacCabe, Head of Production at BFI from 1986 to 1990, writes, "These films bear witness to experience that had not hitherto been thought worthy of cinematic record. From the homoerotics of art in Caravaggio (1986)...[to] the pre-consumerist Liverpudlian working class of Distant Voices, Still Lives (1988) to the postmodern urban youth of The Love Child (1987) and Out of Order (1988), the aim was to find fresh images and new sounds for the British screen."

Other exhibition highlights are Gurinder Chadha's I'm British, But... (1989), a jaundiced perspective on British/Asian nationalism; Martin Jones's and Graham Young's The Long Way Round (1989), a clever study of an office building populated by three security guards, two business people, and a maintenance man; Richard Kwietniowski's Flames of Passion (1990), an award-winning film loosely based on Noel Coward's one-act play Still Life; and Karen Ingham's Salvation Guaranteed (1990), about a British woman who leaves her husband in Lancashire and runs away with her lover to a religiously fundamentalist Texas town. Challenging prejudices and preconceptions in cinema and society, these films offer an engaging, sometimes off-beat view of the world and its inhabitants.

BFI Production, the film production wing of the British Film Institute, has existed in various incarnations since 1951, when the Experimental Film Fund was set up in response to the needs of such avant-garde filmmakers as Ken Russell and Karel Reisz. In 1987, BFI Production established the New Directors program to encourage the production of short films and videos by artists in the early stages of their careers. More recently, the Production Projects fund was created to support film and video projects produced outside London.
