CONTENT

The exhibition documents the business and art of one of Hollywood's major studios during the reign of its Vice-President in Charge of Production, Jack L. Warner -- the man who ran the studio. Comprising rarely seen correspondence, scripts, contracts, set designs, and props, **BEHIND THE**SHIELD reveals the production side of the studio system, from the founding of Warner Bros. in 1923 to Mr. Warner's departure in 1967.

Highlights include the original plans and elevations of such sets as Stella's apartment in *A Streetcar Named Desire* (Elia Kazan, 1951) and Rick's Cafe in *Casablanca* (Michael Curtiz, 1942) and such props as John Wayne's gun in *Rio Bravo* (Howard Hawks, 1959) and James Dean's blue jeans in *Rebel Without a Cause* (Nicholas Ray, 1955).

VIDEO

David L. Wolper's documentary *Here's Looking at You*, *Warner Bros*. (1992), covering the studio's history and narrated by Chevy Chase, Clint Eastwood, Goldie Hawn, and Barbra Streisand, shows continuously in the gallery.
