## CONTENT

This is the first international museum survey devoted exclusively to the genre of the gay documentary and nonnarrative film and video, which has been developing for the past thirty years. The exhibition is presented on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion on June 27, 1969, in Greenwich Village, a signal event which launched the worldwide Gay Liberation Movement.

The forty-three works in the exhibition, by gay artists or with gay-related content, explore such personal and social attitudes as identity, gender, and community. Program categories include AIDS, Women's Issues, Aging, Human Rights, Anti-Gay Violence, Imagery, and History and Role Models.

Highlights include Blow Job (1964, Andy Warhol), Portrait of Jason (1967, Shirley Clarke), Gertrude Stein: When This You See Remember Me (1971, Perry Miller Adato), Word is Out (1978, Mariposa Film Group), Taxi Zum Klo (1980, Frank Ripploh), The Times of Harvey Milk (1984, Robert Epstein and Richard Schmiechen), Before Stonewall (1986, Greta Schiller and Robert Rosenberg), Tongues Untied (1989, Marlon Riggs), Absolutely Positive (1990, Peter Adair), Paris is Burning (1990, Jenny Livingston), It Wasn't Love (1992, Sadie Benning), and Warrior Marks (1993, Pratibha Parmar).
