The Museum of Modern Art announces an Exhibition of Modern Architecture which will open on February 10, 1932. The exhibit will continue at the Museum's headquarters, 730 Fifth Avenue, for a period of about six weeks.

The Exhibition will show by means of American and European models and by enlarged photographs of executed works, which have been prepared specially for the Exhibition, the latest world developments in modern architecture.

The American architects represented by models are: Frank Lloyd Wright, Raymond Hood, Howe & Lescaze, Bowman Brothers, Richard Neutra; the European architects: Mies van der Rohe, Walter Gropius, J. J. P. Oud, Le Corbusier and Otto Haesler.

The Exhibition, which is under the direction of Philip Johnson of Cleveland, has been in preparation since December, 1930. After its closing in New York the Exhibition will make a three years' tour of the United States. Included at present in the definite itinerary are the following cities: Philadelphia, Hartford, Los Angeles, Buffalo, Cleveland, Milwaukee, Cincinnati, Toledo, Rochester, Worcester and Cambridge.
