

CAVE AND CLIFF PAINTINGS FROM THE FROBENIUS COLLECTION -- This exhibition will present for the first time in America a comprehensive series of specially prepared facsimiles from the great collection of the Forschungsinstitut für Kulturmorphologie in Frankfurt-on-Main, Germany. The selection has been made under the supervision of the Director of the Institute, Professor Leo Frobenius. The entire range of prehistoric cave painting and relief from Scandinavia to South Africa will be represented. This exhibition will be under the direction of Dr. Douglas C. Fox, an American member of the Forschungsinstitut.

The Museum will also hold a number of smaller exhibitions which will be announced later.

Surrealism and Fantastic Art is the second in a series of comprehensive exhibitions of important movements in modern art; the first of the series, Cubism and Abstract Art, was held in March and April, 1936 and is now being circulated to museums throughout the country.

MODERN ENGLISH ARCHITECTURE -- England during the past few years has taken its place as one of the most active centers of modern architecture in the world. This exhibition will review a great variety of architectural problems, including a particularly interesting series of zoo buildings. Modern English Architecture will be under the direction of Ernestino M. Fantl, Curator of Architecture and Industrial Art.

EDWARD MCKNIGHT KAUFFER: POSTERS -- The Californian artist, McKnight Kauffer, has dominated modern English poster design for many years. This will be his first one-man show in America.

Mar. 3 - Apr. 18

INTERNATIONAL PHOTOGRAPHY -- This exhibition will be a comprehensive survey of the work of contemporary photographers and will endeavor to demonstrate new visions of the world made possible by the camera. Among the branches to be included are portrait, landscape, industrial, documentary, news, color, clinical, aerial, astronomical, X-ray, and architectural photography. In addition there will be a section devoted to the history of photography and allied photo-mechanical reproductive processes. This exhibition will be under the direction of Beaumont Newhall, Librarian of the Museum. Mr. Newhall has just left for a two months trip abroad to collect material for the exhibition.
